Terrible Fight Between a Colored Man and a Bear.

Rufus Reed, a colored man, well known in this city, bought a bear a few weeks ago and started out through the country with him. Last Sunday Rufus, or so much as was left of him, arrived in the city from McAden's factory for repairs. He and the bear had had a fight and the colored man only saved his own life by cutting the bear's throat. Reed was terribly mangled. His fingers were bitten off, and part of one foot, and one entire heel, together with a big piece of meat from his leg, were missing. He states that himself and the bear were in a room together, when, for some unaccountable cause, Bruin became enraged and jumped on him. The two fought around the room for some time, when finally the bear got the man down in a corner and was about to make short shrift of him. Already one of Reed's hands had been torn to fragments, and the bear had the other hand in his mouth. Reed managed to grasp a knife in his lacerated hand and drove it into the bear's throat, when the beast rolled over dead and the battle was ended. But for the knife which Reed fortunately had with him, the bear would undoubtedly have killed him. Dr. Bob Gray dressed Reed's wounds and left him in a fair way to mend up, by and by.—Charlotte Journal-Observer.

Members of the Legislature Indicted for Gambling.

St. LOUIS, June 4.—A dispatch from Austin, Tex., says that the grand jury has indicted from forty to fifty members of the Legislature for gambling. Quite a number of those indicted have left money with counsel to plead guilty and pay a minimum fine, rather than go to trial in court.

Another dispatch from the same place says that some one entered the County Clerk's office Saturday night and stole all the indictments returned by the grand jury for violations of the gambling law, including those against the members of the Legislature. There is no clue to the thief, but sporting circles are greatly elated.

Wilmington Star: The storm of Saturday afternoon last did considerable damage. A great many fences were prostrated, and the driving rain beat through a great many houses, flooding them with water and in many instances damaging furniture. Buildings that were never known to leak before succumbed to the combined assaults of the furious elements. A number of bad wash-outs are reported, the most serious of which are in the neighborhood of Front and Castle, Second and Ann, and Thirteenth and Market streets. The kitchen on the premises of the Parsley house, corner of Third and

Ann streets, occupied by Mr. F. Burruss, was undermined by the flood of water and was left inclined to one side in such a manner as to threaten its instant demolition. At the County Poor House, where the wind had full scope, serious apprehensions were felt that the building would be swept away. As it was, a large portion of the stockade was prostrated. The wind was from a point which is termed north-north-west, and therefore blew nearly directly off-shore, which renders serious disasters at sea less probable than was at first supposed.

The Story Without an End.

Again, its great monetary value seems almost monotonous. The 155th Grand Monthly Drawing of The Louisiana State Lottery at New Orleans, on April 16th, has this record: Ticket No. 62,887 drew the first grand prize of \$75,000, of which Henry M. Kiessling, of No. 188 Dearborn st., Chicago, Ill., and A. Garnier Tricot, Vermilionville, La., held each one-fifth. Ticket No. 72,692 won the second capital of \$25,000—collected in one whole lump through The Manufacturers' National bank of Troy, for M. Connolly, of Troy, N. Y. Ticket No. 52,989 won the third capital, \$10,000, and was sold in fifths—and to Edwin T. Eisenburg, Jr. (collected through The Central Bank of Philadelphia; another to H. H. Harper, of St. George's, Colleton Co., S. C.; another to Wm. H. Hampton, of Tracy City, Franklin Co., Tenn.; another to R. F. Kruger, No. 241 Fourth st., Milwaukee, Wis. The two fourth capital prizes of \$6,000 each were sold to holders of tickets No. 58,507 and 26,502—two fifths were sold to James R. Day, Malta Bend, Saline Co., Mo., and to parties in Fort Wayne, Ind., New Haven, Conn. For further information apply to M. A.
