We are glad to chronicle the fact that this school will be again opened in Newbern on the 25th of June. Its work will be in preparation for a new and superior session of five weeks, under the charge of an accomplished teacher and assistantfrom Washington, Cify, D. C. This principal, Miss Somerfille, will conduct a strictly normal course in literature and pedagecies. It is an effort made by the State to offer training of highest character to teachers, disposed to study hard and clevate themselves and the r race. The local Board of Directors in this city have worked out this plan in hopes of advancing the educational at 6:30 A. M., arriving in Newtern at status of the colored teacher.

A Gold Mine in Pamlico.

We have always used our efforts to impress our citizens of the great value of their lands, but we had not the slightest idea that we should be the first to chronicle the finding of a gold mine in our midst. Such seems to be the fact, however. Mr. James T. Lincoln showed us specimens of this precious metal found on his farm below here. The lump he showed us was about the size of a small hen egg-a piece of solid substance of the quartz specie, and was well dotted with fine gold. The presence of gold on the land was discovered by Peter Miller, a tenant on Mr. Lincoln's farm, and upon investigation he finds it lies in a body about about four feet in depth. The exact area of the mine is not yet ascertained. He has sent a specimen of it to Professor Dabney to be analyzed and to get its commercial value. So we may expect soon to find a new industry springing up in our midst. Truly wonders never cease.—Pamlico Enterprise.
