The following account of loss and accidents of British vessels is extracted from Lloyd's List of 1829: On foreign voyages, 157 wrecked, 284 driven on shore, of which 224 are known to have been got off, and probably more; 21 foundered or sunk; 1 run down; 35 abandoned at sea, and 8 of them afterwards carried into port; 12 condemed is unseaworthy; 9 upset, one of them righted; 27 missing, one of them a packet, no doubt foundered. Coasters and colliers-109 wrecked, 297 driven on shore, of which 121 known to have been got off, and probably many more; 97 foundered or sunk, four of them raised, 6 run down; 13 abandoned, 5 of them afterwards carried in; 3 apset, 2 of them righted; 16 missing, no doubt foundered.
