"HIS EXCELLENCY."

The subject of constitutional titles, if it should be deemed expedient to take into consideration a revision of the constitution at the present time, ought not to be overlooked. It is not, perhaps, of sufficient importance in itself to justify the call of a convention for the express purpose—but when a convention is called, we hope the good sense of those whom the people may delegate for composing that body, will, on their first glance at the "Executive power," strike out the title of "His Excellency," now appended to the office of Governor. The title of "Governor" is, in itself, significant and proper, as are the titles of "General," "Colonel," &c. to military officers; but why the Governor should also be dubbed with the additional title of "His Excellency," no man on earth can give a reasonable why or wherefore. It is but a relic of the folly and parade of Kings and Queens, and it cannot be but disgusting to the common sense of a Republican Governor to be a dresed by such title. Abolish this and the HONORABLE and ESQUIRES, assumed by the council, the Senate, and house of Representatives, will also fall into disrepute. We know not how this suggestion may be received by others, there are doubtless some who are pleased with the unmeaning, though high-sounding titles of "His Excellency, the Governor!" "The Honorable Council!" and "The Honorable Senate!" as announced by the shrill voice of the door-keeper of the House of Representatives, every morning on the assembling of those august bodies to attend prayers; these, of course will oppose the abolition of titles; but we must trust the good sense of the republicans of our State is with us. We believe there are very few of the States, if any, besides New Hampshire and Massachusetts, that recognize any such constitutional title.

The Executive of the United States has no title except that of President, which indicates his official character. There was indeed, an attempt on the part of the aristocratic branch of the general government, to affix to his name a high-sounding appellation; but the good sense of the popular branch set the matter at rest—The following is the account given of this by Mr. Jefferson, in a letter written at Paris, soon after the formation of the federal constitution. "The Senate and Representatives differed about the title of the President. The former wanted to style him His Highness George Washington, President of the United States, and Protector of their liberties." The latter insisted and prevailed, to give no title but that of office, to wit: "George Washington, President of the United States;" and he adds, "I hope the terms of Excellency, Honor, Worship, Esquire, will for ever disappear from among us from that moment. I wish that Mr. would follow them." There is too much of this aping aristocracy in our country, and in Congress, even now, it seems to be a growing evil; we can scarcely cast our eyes on the congressional debates, without being assailed with "the Honorable gentleman from Massachusetts," "my Honorable friend," &c. &c. some half a dozen times within the compass of a short paragraph. If these gentlemen would but reflect a moment on the extreme folly of thus imitating the members of the English House of Lords and Commons, they would certainly avoid it. How long will these men be satisfied with plain "Honorable?" We shall have "Right Honorables" next! N. H. Patriot.

Banks.—A bank upon a new plan has been projected, and is likely to be incorporated by the legislature of Pennsylvania. It is to be called the tradesmen's Bank with a capital to be \$300,000, in shares of \$25 each. The peculiar provisions of the charter are, that no person shall hold more than 40 shares; that no person shall be an original purchaser of stock, or a stock holder at any time, except he be a citizen of Pennsylvania, and a tradesman mechanic or manufacturer, actually engaged in a mechanical employment or occupation, and who has been so employed for one year previously; that no others shall be eligible as directors or officers; that there shall not be in the board of directors at any one time more than two persons; engaged in the same employment or occupations; that no person shall receive an accommodation or discount, except tradesmen, mechanics and manufacturers; that no single person shall receive accommodation as principal or endorser beyond one thousand dollars; that no notes shall be discounted for less than ten, or more than two hundred dollars; that no more than three fourths of the directors shall be re-eligible; and that the whole capital stock be paid in within two years.

Banking Extraordinary.—An act has been passed by the Legislature of the Territory of Florida, incorporating a bank, to be called "the Union Bank of Florida," with a capital of One Million of Dollars, to be founded upon real estate, to be represented by bonds, &c. on the faith of which the capital of the Bank is to be borrowed.
