

He, who but yesterday coved the forest with us, gathering wild flowers, listening to the songs of birds or watching the brook-bright and sunuy daughter of the hill-leaping and bounding in its joyous way along the banks of emerald-pouring over the tiny cataract, its bright water sparkling in the sun light-meandering through the vale, till it finally loses itself in the bosom of the silvery lake has had his life's blood chilled by the touch, of the cold and bony finger of death. What is left of him-but a dream? She, by whose side we used to spend our leisure hours; whose presence was our joy; whose smile our happiness; whose eye was not exceeded in brightness by the eye of the gazelle; whose sylph-like form was unrivalled for beau ty and symmetry-has departed! TREASURY DEPARTMENT. April 12th, 1833. N the late conflagration of the Treasury building, nearly all the correspondence of the Secretary of the Treasury, from the estab-

lishment of the Department to the 31st March, 1833, was destroyed including, as well the tight barrels; and the soap and candles in strong original letters and communications addressed to the Secretary of the Treasury, as the records of the letters and communications written by him. With a view to repair the loss, as far as may be practicable, all officers of the United States, are requested to cause copies to be prepared, and authenticated by them, of any let ters (excepting those hereinafter alluded to, which they may at any time have written to) or received from, the Secretary of the Treasury; and all those who have been in office, and other individuals throughout the United States, are invited to do the same. That this correspondence may be arranged into appropriate books, it is requested that it be copied on folio foolscap paper, with a sufficient margin on all sides to admit of binding, and that no more than one letter be containe on a leaf. It is also requested, that the copies be written in a dispensing with one or more articles at any plain and distinct or engrossing hand. Where time b fore entering into contracts; and also the original letter can be spared it would be preferred. The reasonable expense incurred in copying the papers now requested, not ex ceeding the rate of ten cents for every hundred words, will be defrayed by the Department. The correspondence which has been saved. and of which, therefore, no copies are desired. are the records of the letters written by the to by the District Attorney, or by some person Secretary of the Treasury to Presidents and Cashiers of Banks, from the 1st October, 1819, to the 20th February, 1833; all the correspondence relating to Revolutionary claims under the act of 15th May, 1828, and to claims of Virginia officers to half pay, under the act of 5th July, 1832; and to applications for the bc nefits of the acts of the 2d March, 1831, and 14th July, 1832, for the relief of certain insolvent debtors of the United States. Copies of some circular letters and instructions, written by the Secretary, have also been preserved and it is requested that, before a copy be made of any circular letter or instruction, written by the Secretary of the Treasury, the date and object of the circular be first stated to the Department, and its wishes on the subject ascertained.
