Second. To credit the said heirs with all moneys advanced or expended by the said Fulton, in and about the business of the United States, committed to his care...

Third. To credit the said heirs a compensation commensurate with the value and importance of the services rendered by the said Robert Fulton, to the United States...

Fourth. To credit the said heirs with the like compensation, for the services of the said Robert Fulton, for inventing and in superintending the construction of a steam frigate...

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, a Convention for a second additional article to the Treaty of Limits between the United States of America and the United Mexican States, the ratifications of which were exchanged in this city on the fifth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty two...

And the ratifications of said treaty having been exchanged in the city of Washington, on the fifth day of April, in the year of 1832, but from various causes the contracting parties have been unable to perform the stipulations contained in the above mentioned third article...

Within the space of one year, to be estimated from the date of the exchange of the ratifications of this said additional article, there shall be appointed by the Government of the United States of America and the Mexican United States, each a commissioner and surveyor...

In faith of which the said Plenipotentiaries have hereunto set their respective seals.

AND WHEREAS, the said Convention has been duly ratified on both parts, and the respective ratifications of the same were exchanged at Washington, the twentieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six...
