Cain, Smith and Battle were sent for and amputated his right arm and leg above the places where the saw had severed them, but the patient died about 8 o'clock that night. Mr. Cole was a young unmarried man about 25 years of age, very industrious, bore an excellent character, and was beloved by all who knew him. His death will prove a great loss to the community.
