WILL THERE BE WAR?

A dispatch from Santiago De Chile, January 23d, says:

"There is great excitement in this city over a report that an ultimatum has been received from the United States demanding that the controversy over the outrage perpetrated on the members of the crew of the United States cruiser Baltimore be adjusted without further delay. It is stated that the ultimatum is couched in the strongest possible terms."

The New York Herald's Santiago correspondent says that there is not a remote probability of war between the United States and Chile; that the matter will be settled by arbitration.

LATER.—Last Monday President Harrison transmitted to Congress the correspondence with Chile, and in his message he submits the whole matter to the war-making power of our government. Although President Harrison's message reads like war, we shall continue to hope that there will be no war.

Chairman Smith has called a meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee to meet in Raleigh on March 2d to fix the date and place and to issue the call for the State Convention, and for the transaction of such business as may come before it. It will be a very important meeting and Chairman Smith urges all the members of the Committee to attend.

The Wilmington Star says "Kentucky is the great tobacco growing State, the crop of 1889, according to the census, being 221,880,303 pounds, valued at \$13,155,297. Virginia comes next with 18,522,655 pounds and North Carolina third with 36,375,258 pounds. But North Carolina, which is behind Virginia in quantity, leads her in quality, for while Virginia's crop was valued at \$1,321,649, North Carolina's was valued at \$5,175,833."

SOMETHING NEW IN NORTH CAROLINA.

The Raleigh News and Observer of Saturday, Jan. 23d, publishes the following which we hope is true:

"We learn that Bishop Hayman is about establishing at his beautiful home at Hillsboro, an institution that promises to be of great practical benefit to the South. It will have two distinct and separate departments. One will be for ladies where they will receive careful practical instruction in all the branches of domestic economy. This will comprehend everything that has to do with practical housekeeping and also regular instruction in every department of cooking. It is a mistake to suppose that fine cooking is intended for the gratification of the palates of epicures. The preparation of food in the way best calculated to make it wholesome and digestible has more to do than almost anything else with the promotion of health and happiness. Food badly prepared contributes very largely to ill health. This department will be under the care and direction of Miss Juliet Corson, who has been for many years at the head of a large institution of a similar character in New York, where she had under her care many of the daughters of some of our most cultivated people."

She is acknowledged to be the highest authority in everything that has to do with domestic economy and cookery. Her instruction is more valuable than that of any one else who has been engaged in undertakings of this kind. She is regarded as the best and most thorough of all instructors in these matters. New buildings will be erected to be used for the purposes mentioned and it is expected that the work will speedily be begun.

NORTH CAROLINA NEWS.

Judge Winston in a letter to the Biblical Recorder advocates a re-tentative for bays.

The Prohibitionists have decided to hold a State Convention in Greensboro on February 24th.

Col. J. S. Carr, of Durham, has consented to deliver an address at the next Teachers' Assembly at Morehead on "What Business Men Expect of the Public Schools." Secretary Harrell has nearly completed the programme, and it will be the best programme ever yet arranged.

Colonel John Wesley Payne died at Greensboro Saturday, Jan. 16th, after a long and painful illness. He was born in Davidson county, and was 63 years of age. He graduated at Trinity College; was in the Confederate army during the whole war; he was Clerk of the Superior Court of Guilford; was Clerk of the Federal Court; was Clerk of the Register of Deeds at the time of his death.

The trial of the Grimsley case was called in Greene Superior Court one day last week. The defendant W. E. Grimsley pleaded guilty of the assault on the Rev. Mr. Abernathy. Thereupon the Solicitor with the concurrence of Rev. Mr. Abernathy's attorney moved the Court that judgment might be suspended.

Kinston Free Press: In his sermon at the Methodist church Sunday Rev. F. M. Shambarger referred to the fact that another person had been licensed to sell liquor in Kinston. He had heard that some of the liquor dealers of Kinston had remarked that if the church members of the town would withdraw their patronage from them they would have to close up shop! Weldon News: The merchants of Wilmington, who have taken the lead in the fight against paying the merchants' purchase tax, are in no way disheartened by the adverse decision of the State Supreme Court and will take the case to the Supreme Court of the United States. It will be a long time before the question is determined by that tribunal unless the Court will give it precedence, as it sometimes does in important cases where large numbers of people are interested and the ends of justice are hastened.
