Deception is your leader and not the nation's friend.

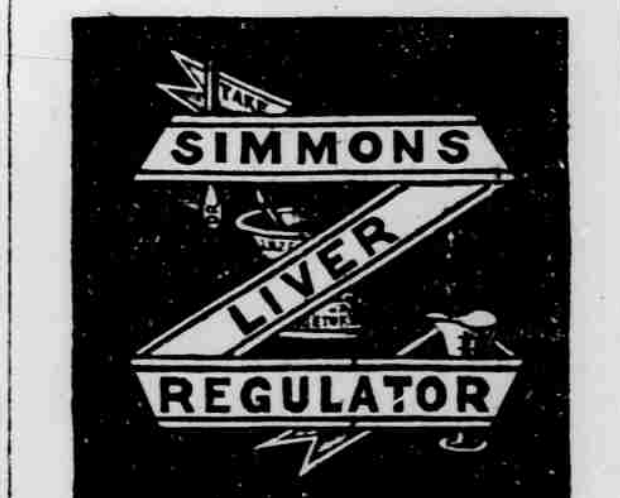
If your number of feet is even, surely there will be no charm;

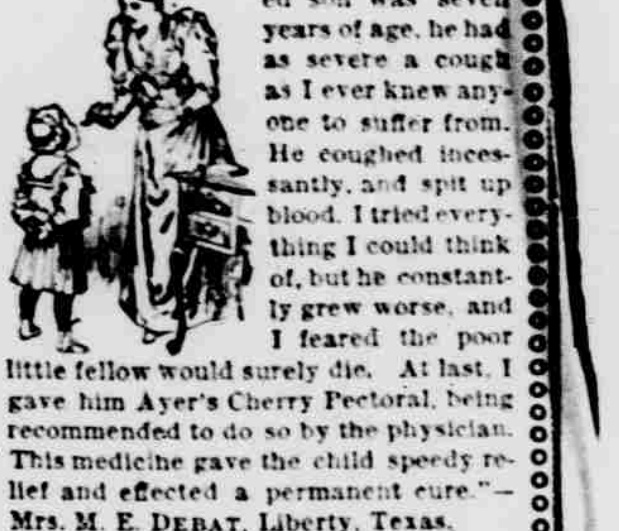
