The pictorial label is simplicity itself. The colored representation of the fruit indicated explains its object and purpose alone. There is nothing to confuse the eye of the housekeeper as she runs it over the shelves of her preserve closet in search of a particular fruit. The labels can be used but once, but they may be purchased very cheaply, and come all gummed and ready to attach. It is safe to say that many a progressive housekeeper will make liberal use of them this year, and the fact that the fruits which they distinguish may be recognized much more quickly and readily by means of their aid than with that of the old-time written label constitutes no insignificant point in their favor.-Chicago Times-Herald.
