Law Governing Presidential Elec-

tion--Read and Circulate. The election for President and Vice-President which occurs on TUESDAY, the Fifth of November next, is to be held as near as may be in conformity with the election law of 1872: that is to say-

Books of Registration must be immediately re-opened by the Registrar, and persons qualified allowed to register, until the day of election-excluding that day.

Persons must vote in the Township where they reside.

Tickets must be printed on white paper and without device.

No certificates of registration must

be given. Registration not allowed on the day of election except where a person has arrived at the age of twenty-one, or for
