A PROCLAMATION.

By his Excellency the Governor of North Carolina. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, Raleigh, Aug. 31st, 1871.

WHEREAS, information has been received at this Department that PATRON SHOPE, late of Cherokee county, stands charged with the murder of A. W. Lawrence, in said county, and that said Shoppe has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served on him;

Now, therefore, I, TOD R. CALDWELL, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue Proclamation offering a reward of Four Hundred Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of said Patron Shoppe to the Sheriff of Cherokee county, and I do enjoin all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.

Done at our City of Raleigh, this 31st day of August, A. D., 1871, and in the [L. S.] year of American Independence the ninety-sixth. TOD R. CALDWELL.
