On Sunday night the 9th inst, the Town Hall and Station House at Weldon N. C. was destroyed by fire.

Two yellow fever deaths in Memphis on the 10th. Three new cases reported.

President Johnson has received from first National Bank Washington \$22,000, of \$73,000 he had on deposit.

Judge Underwood, of Va., was attacked in Richmond on Tuesday by W. N. McVeigh former owner of property in Alexandria purchased by Underwood, under confiscation act.

The Assasin at Work in Norfolk, Va.—A Well Known Gentleman is Hacked to Pieces and Probably Fatally Wounded.

A serious difficulty occurred in Norfolk, Va., on Tuesday night, which may result in the death of Mr. Robert O. Epes, a merchant and well known gentleman of that city.

The parties to the affair were Mr. Robert O. Epes, a well known gentleman of this city, and a man by the name of Joseph Barnes, who for some unknown cause, took upon himself the role of the assasin, and deliberately and fiendishly attempted to take the life of his victim.

Both of the parties, as we learn, were in the procession which went around on Tuesday evening to serenade the different candidates elect. Near the residence of Major W. E. Foster, on Bermuda street, Mr. Epes received the first intimation that Barnes intended to harm him.

This occurred between 9 and 10 o'clock. About an hour later the parties had some words at the residence of a gentleman in the West End, but no blows were passed. Again, a short time afterwards on Freemason street, near the residence of Major C. B. Duffield, the difficulty was renewed.

Barnes repeating some very offensive language which he had used several times during the evening, when Mr. Epes slapped him in the face. Barnes immediately drew a butcher or sailor's sheath-knife, which he had concealed upon his person, and stabbed Mr. Epes twice, once in the left side, under the arm, and once in the abdomen, both very deep and dangerous wounds.

As soon as the stabbing was inflicted, Barnes threw the knife into the yard of Major Duffield, and drew a shoe-maker's hammer, which he also had concealed. This was wrenched from him, when he made his escape.

Mr. Epes was attended within a few minutes by Dr. Nash, who lived in the vicinity of the affray, after which he was placed upon a shutter and carried to his room in the Atlantic Hotel, where his wounds were dressed by Drs. Nash, Galt and Harris.

Two or three hours after the cutting, Barnes was arrested in a house on Cove street, on a warrant issued by Justice John A. Rosson.

Yesterday morning he was partially examined before His Honor Mayor Ludlow, when several witnesses were heard. Their evidence all showed plainly that Barnes was the guilty party, but was very meagre, by far the most important witnesses not having yet been called, and the substance is given in the narrative above.

The Mayor, after hearing it, committed Barnes to jail to await the result of Mr. Epes' wounds, refusing bail, as he was in duty bound to do.

"Of this affair, we have no hesitation in saying that it was a brutal, cowardly, maliciously premeditated attack of an armed ruffian upon an unarmed man. It is susceptible of proof that Barnes upon several occasions during the day threatened to cut Mr. Epes to pieces that night, and his arming himself with deadly and unusual weapons was a proof that he intended the bloody work which he afterwards carried out. Of his past life we prefer not to speak, his present atrocious attempt at assassination being the crime for which he must be tried and punished.

"We are much pleased to state

that Mr. Epes' condition last night was considered more favorable, and at a late hour he was resting quietly. His physicians express a good deal of hope for his recovery."

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION. By His Excellency, the Governor of North Carolina. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, Raleigh, Oct. 22, 1873.

WHEREAS, The people of North Carolina have been abundantly blessed during the past year, and the earth hath yielded bounteously of all the products of its soil, so that the garner of the husbandman are filled to overflowing; and the industrious mechanic has realized a rich reward for his labor, and every class of our population has prospered in all laudable enterprises; and WHEREAS, above all, fraternal feelings and good will have in a great measure been restored in our midst, and no plague, pestilence or famine, has visited our State: Now therefore, as it becomes us, a grateful people, to render thanks to Almighty God for these and numberless other blessings showered upon us in His great mercy; I, Rod R. Caldwell, Governor of North Carolina, in obedience to law and in conformity with an honored precedent, do appoint and set apart
