No change to note in the home money market, save that matters are daily, though slowly, improving.

Latest advices from New York:—Gold stronger at 83 3/4. Money 7. Sterling steady. Governments strong but dull. States quiet and strong. From London:—New Fives 92. Erie 38 1/2.

COMMERCIAL.

The dullness in the cotton market has had a depressing effect on business. A good many country wagons and carts were, however, observed in the city yesterday, and there have been moderate transactions in cotton and all other branches of business.

Receipts for the week ending Saturday 1,140 bales. Sept. 1st to date 9,045 bales.

Monday and Tuesday 147 bales. Price in the local market ruled to-day 13 1/2 to 13 3/4 basis low middlings.

Latest from New York:—Futures closed easy; sales 15,600 bales; as follows: December 15 1-16 1/2; January 15 13-32 1/2 7-16; February 15 25-32 1/2 13-16; March 16 1/2 16 3, 16; April 16 1/2 16 9-16.

Cotton steady; sales 8,364 bales at 15 1/2; some sales 1/2 higher.

From Liverpool:—Cotton dull and easier; uplands 8 1/2 @ 8 3/4; Orleans 8 3/4 @ 8 1/2; sales 10,000 bales, speculation and export 2,000; uplands not below good ordinary, shipped November 8 1/2.
