THE CAROLINA CENTRAL RAILWAY AND CITY OF WILMINGTON.—The completion of the Carolina Central Railway between Charlotte and Wilmington is looked for as a certainty by the latter part of August next, and when finished will be one of the best in the Southern States.

THE COUNTRY THROUGH which the road passes, being about two hundred and forty-seven miles, is as good as any in the world, and the property of the citizens of Wilmington, Wadesboro, Monroe, Charlotte, Lincoln, Shelby and other localities will be vastly enhanced in value. We learn that as soon as the road is completed a line of steamers will be put on between Wilmington and New York, thus affording a portion of country heretofore almost isolated a direct communication with the North and foreign countries.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The Irish societies achieved the grandest display ever made in Washington. They were in full regalia and had seven bands of music in the ranks.

The following nominations have been made to the Senate: McLaw, collector first district of Georgia. B. F. Beel, postmaster at Americus, Georgia.

A committee from New Orleans has presented the President with his portrait on horseback. The picture is the gift of Dr. Crasto, of New Orleans, and was painted by Pierson.

St. Patrick's day was generally celebrated throughout the country. In Washington City the President reviewed the procession.

The procession in honor of St. Patrick's day in Philadelphia consisted of fully ten thousand persons. There were thirty bands of music, and Barouches filled with children, decked with ribbons and green sashes.

Col. O. P. Robie, formerly of the U. S. Army, has committed suicide in San Francisco.

LONDON, March 17.—The British journals generally consider the Chislehurst activities a success. The Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh will soon visit the Empress Eugenie.

MADRID, March 17.—The Carlist leader Tristany has been defeated at Taragona. It is rumored that the Carlists have raised the siege of Bilboa.

BAYONNE, March 17.—General Sebals, according to the Carlist reports, has captured a column of 2,500 men under General Nouvilas.

CITY OF MEXICO, March 10.—Via Havana.—A fearful outrage was perpetrated by a mob in Abasco county, in the State of Jalisco, last Sunday. In the morning, the Priest delivered an incendiary sermon in the course of which he advocated the extermination of Protestants.

This so excited his hearers that the mob gathered in the evening, and proceeded to the residence of Rev. Jno. Stevens, a Congressional minister, sent out by the Boston Board of Foreign Missions, with cries, "long live the Priests." They broke into, and seizing the clergyman smashed his head to jelly, and chopped his body into pieces. They afterwards sacked the house and carried off every thing of value.

After much delay the riot was suppressed by the local authorities. The government has sent a detachment of troops to the place. A rigid investigation has been set on foot, and orders have been issued for the arrest of all the priests in Abasco county and the neighboring town of Teshitan. The mob in Saynayo, acting under similar religious frenzy, attacked the small garrison of the town, burned the public archives, and pillaged the houses of the authorities.

The government of Jalisco has arrested nine of the bandits who robbed the stage near Guadalajara and killed Westfall and Bartholy. A portion of the property taken from the passengers was found in the possession of the prisoners.

The Governor of the District of Mexico has issued an order prohibiting cock-fighting as a practice unworthy of civilized people. Troops are guarding the road leading to San Luis Potosi to insure the safety of travelers.

General Santa Anna will remain at Jalisco some time before going to the capital.

Quicksilver mines have been discovered in Seacatecas.
