POSTSCRIPT.

An arrival at Philadelphia brings London papers as late as the 22d of July.

A letter from London of the 22d July, says, "The zeal manifesting itself among the middle classes of society, in the capital, ever since the defence bill has been in progress through the House of Commons, proves that heavy as our taxes are, and heavier as they will be, and enormous as is the national debt, when a foreign foe threatens to invade us, public virtue still animates and pervades us."

"A report is current this morning, that the French have made an attempt on the island of Jersey, and in the attempt have lost six thousand men."

The long pending discussions between the British government and the United States, respecting the claims of the American citizens, for captures by British cruisers during the last war, are now happily brought very near a conclusion.

A letter from Brussels, July 7, brought by the Hamburg Mail says, "In all our harbours ships are building with the utmost expedition for the invasion of England. The number of troops to be employed in the expedition is now estimated at 200,000 men."

From Genoa it is said, a squadron of five first of French line of battle ships and six frigates have escaped from Toulon.

Four days previous to the sailing of Captain Clarke, from St. Croix, a Danish Guineaman arrived there in 24 days from Copenhagen, with intelligence that the first consul had evacuated the territory of Hanover in consequence of a special remonstrance from the northern powers...

In a London paper of the 16th July the French government are said to be in such distress for money, that they have offered the house of Hope & Co. at Amsterdam, 12 per cent, to advance the 85 millions of livres which the United States have agreed to pay for Louisiana; but it has been declined under 13, and some say 15 per cent.

Capture of the French fleet from St. Domingo. Captain Small, who arrived at Portland in 16 days from St. Croix, informs, that on the 5th ult. a British fleet arrived there from St. Christophers, with information that Admiral Jarvis had fallen in with the French fleet from St. Domingo, and captured four sail of the line & five frigates.

The prevailing fever in New York continues to spread desolation and death throughout that devoted city. It is said that upwards of 40,000 persons have removed into the country, notwithstanding which there were 29 new cases and 6 deaths, in 24 hours ending the 2d instant.

Dr. JOHN CONRIT has been appointed Senator of the United States, by the Vice President of New Jersey, to supply the vacancy occasioned by the expiration of the time for which Aaron Ogden was elected.
