Burns and scalds are usually consid ered under four grades, based upon the depth and injury of the tissues. The first includes inflammation of the outer skin or cuticle, or epidermis. Redness, swelling and moderate smarting marks this grade. Rarely any constitutional disturbance appears. Its peculiar indications, in a day or more, pass entirely away and the cuticle in a short time disappears. The second is skin, or cutis, or derma- Blisters, redits presence. The disturbance of the great. But ten days or more are necessary to restore the skin to its former healthy state. The third grade means the destruction of the outer layer of the derma.
