They forego their right to take part in the ena-tment of local laws, or the direction of pub ic improvements. T eys mply pay wha ever is demanded in the happ of taxes, grumbling perhaps at the size of the pile, but never seem to think that they have any turber cuty in the premises. Besides these men of wealth there is another large class of business men, and others of mederate fortunes, who ignore local politics because they imagine that they would be containnated by mixing in what they regard as "a dirty scramble for spoils." The abseuce of these powerful ferces leaves the direction of municipal affairs to cla-ses that have the least stake in the results to be obtained. We have little respect for the sentiment that produces this neglect of the duty that every man owes to society. The "respectability" that is so fearful of being sourched is not adapted to the republic.




