Notifying the Magistrates.
W. R. Pool, Esq., chairman, has notified the Magistrates of the county of the adjourned meeting of Magistrates with the Commissioner, which is to be held the first Monday in February, at which the question of borrowing money for the county will come up. The recent decision in regard to taxes has caused the funds to be greatly diminished, and the county is compelled to borrow.

Convicts Discharged.
They were discharged from the Penitentiary yesterday, Albert Oats, colored, convicted in Bladen county of larceny and felony and sentenced to the penitentiary April 1875. He is about 59 years old, 5 feet 8 inches high and weighing when admitted 175 pounds.
On to-day will be released Christopher Sears, colored, convicted in green county of larceny and sentenced to the penitentiary March 1877. He is about 29 years old, 5 feet 10 inches high, and weighing when admitted 158 pounds.

Y. M. C. A.
There was an important meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association last night. The committee on collection of funds from the citizens reported that only two hundred dollars had been paid. This is about half the amount usually collected. The committee was continued and requested to call on all the citizens and collect as much more as possible. The wood committee reported that arrangements had been made by which the wood of an excellent quality furnished at one dollar and ten cents a cord delivered here, it being the year in turn for the N. C. Railroad to haul the wood for the poor free. Col. Andrews, efficient Superintendent has given every facility in his power to have it hauled promptly.
