The Tobacco Tax.

Richmond Whig. It is strange, indeed, that any one can fail to see that as long as only a reduction of the tax on tobacco is sought, the whole question tuins upon how that will affect the revenue. And that consideration is apt to determine the question, even against any reduction as long as the present wants of the revenue continue as great as they are The movement for reduction, whether successful or unsuccessful, still leaves the impost in the attitude of a mere matter of expediency and policy, and the inherent wrong and injustice of the tax, as an unequa, and unconstitutional burden upon the chief product of the soil of Virgin's and of a few other States, is not reached at all by the controversy, Besides, the reduction sought can aff nd no relief to those principally interested in tobacco, the producers and consumers. Any tax, any restriction, not only attaches at once by the nireversible laws of trade to both produce. and consumer, but in this metance places both consumer and producer ut terly at the mercy of the hoensed manufacturers, licensed dealers, &c., giving to the moneyed members o this intermediary class, also, the certain means of tyrannizing over their weaker competitors, and finally monopoliz ug the trade. But the consumer can protect himself to some extent, or he can refuse to use the article at all, with an actual pecuniary saving; and the dealer who finds himself in the meiciless clutches of the large engiossers ci the business, can at least take refuge in some other branch of trade. The case of the Virginia tobacco

planter is different. Tobacco is his money crop, for the most part; to that, the land, the climate and 1 e abor are especially adapted, and if he be robbed of his profit on tobacco by the trovernment, his case is lau indeed. His lands depreciate in value, and his where few of them existed, yet examcrops do not return the costs of production. Not only is the planter himseil ruined (is many instances can now be cited), but the laborers who have heretotore been employed to the tobac o fields are turown out of work, or are engaged at statvation wages-lanemployer and employee, all to sorg or paup risin with equal pace.


