LOCAL BRIEFS.

The receipts at the Internal Revenue office yesterday were \$2,179.01. The quiet continues and the city is disturbed by no news of other unpleasantness.

Chatham county yesterday drew \$1087.50 for the support of her lunatics outside the Asylum.

The guard house people were treated to a lengthy serenade on the head corner yesterday afternoon.

The colored minstrels gave a creditable performance to a good house at Metropolitan Hall last evening.

Drummer's licenses were yesterday issued to Henry, Mead & C., Baltimore, and G. O. C. and Schenker, Philadelphia.

The Indian doctor, who each afternoon holds forth on Fayetteville street, is the most vociferous, and at the same time one of the most amusing of his class ever seen here.

They don't get on their feet and then from matrimony for a couple of marriage licenses were issued yesterday. This month's record in this line will be a fearful one.

There came near being two vacant chairs in the Legislative halls yesterday, as a pair of runaway horses nearly missed running over a couple of Representatives, on Martin street.

EMANCIPATION HISTORICAL SOCIETY.—A number of the colored people of the city met at the Congregational church, to organize this society. The object is to hold an association for purposes of recreation and culture, for the improvement of the race, while a fund will also be accumulated for the celebration of Emancipation day.

The meeting chose the following as officers: J. B. Wilson, President; Benjamin Edwards, Secretary; William Harris; Corresponding Secretary, Kittle Ligon; Treasurer, Kittle Bishop.

SUPREME COURT.—Court met at ten o'clock on yesterday. Present Chief Justice Smith and Justice Dillard.

The following cases were called: First National Bank of Charlotte vs. Smith & Alexander et al. from Mecklenburg; argued; Shipp & Bailey and R. Barringer for the plaintiff, and Wilson & Son for defendants.

A. P. Newhart vs. H. B. Peters et al. from Mecklenburg, argued; J. B. Wilson, Wilson & Son and W. W. Fleming for the plaintiff, and R. Barringer and Shipp & Bailey for defendants.

Court adjourned until to-day at 10 o'clock.

Sheriffs Settled.
A trio of sheriffs paid into the State Treasury yesterday the taxes due by their respective counties, as follows:

Wake leads all the counties in the amount of her taxes. Of the special taxes paid in, \$6,196.41 go to the support of the D. & B. and Insane Asylum; while \$4,130.94 are for the erection of the Penitentiary and support of convicts. Wake pays more than twenty-five times as much tax as some counties in the State.

OUR LAW MAKERS.

SENATE.
WEDNESDAY, JAN 29

The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock, Senator scales on the floor.

The Journal disposed with, and announced as standing approved.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.
A number of reports were submitted and took their regular course.

MESSAGE FROM HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
A message was received from the House of Representatives, transmitting the resignation of His Excellency, Gov. Z. B. Vance, to take effect Feb. 5th, and asking the concurrence of the Senate to have 1000 copies of the same printed.

The Senate refused to concur in the proposition to print.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS.
Mr. Dortch, to simplify bills of indictment in certain cases. Judiciary.

Mr. Stewart, to make the Upper and lower Little Rivers in Hertford county, lawless and to other purposes. Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. White, to levy a special tax. Finance.

By the same, to enable the County Commissioners to ascertain the indebtedness of Corporations. Propositions and Grievances.

Mr. Dortch, in behalf of Cooper Higgins. Claims.

Mr. Re-pass, to change the times for holding the Superior Courts in the counties of Pamlico, Currituck, Pamlico, Dare and Tyrrell. Judiciary.

By the same, to punish the shooting of cattle and live stock running at large. Agriculture.

CALENDAR.
H B 159, S B 244, to amend section 1, chapter 104, laws of 1874-75 in relation to the leasing and shooting of the mountain trout. Passed its third reading and ordered to be enrolled.

S B 257, prescribing the mode for the qualification of attorneys, who have been licensed to practice law in the State. Passed its third reading, ordered to be engrossed and sent to the House of Representatives.

S B 240, concerning the civil actions for the recovery of debts, and in practice for the purchase of lands. Passed final reading, ordered to be engrossed and sent to the House of Representatives.

H B 121, S B 245, to amend chapter 45, of Battle's Revisal. Passed final reading and ordered to be enrolled.

S B 129, to amend section 1, chapter 219, laws of 1876-77, which will exempt Lenoir county from the deer bill. Passed final reading, engrossed and sent to House of Representatives.

H B 91, S B 267, to amend section 9, section 33, Code of Civil Procedure. Passed final reading and enrolled.

S B 203, to repeal section 12, chapter 16, of Battle's Revisal. Provides for the driving of cattle through certain roads in the State. Passed final reading, engrossed and sent to House of Representatives.

S B 75, to amend section 343, chapter 17, of Battle's Revisal.

Mr. Henderson moved to re-commit to the Judiciary Committee. Carried.

S B 219, to amend section 27, Battle's Revisal. This bill provides for the changing of the meetings of the County Commissioners. Passed final reading, engrossed and sent to the House of Representatives.

H B 32, S B 136, to amend chapter 2, of Battle's Revisal, and chapter 274, laws of 1876-77, so as to abolish the office of State Geologist.

Mr. Alexander moved to have the bill printed, and made special order for Wednesday next.

S B 266, in relation to the ton tax on fertilizers. This bill was postponed and made special order for Saturday next at 12 o'clock.

S B 181, for relief of Sheriff and Tax Collectors. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Mr. Caldwell moved to indefinitely postpone. Carried.

S B 202, concerning the support of lunatics.

Mr. Robins moved to take up the special order for to-day at 12 o'clock. Carried.

SPECIAL ORDER.
The special order set apart for to-day at 12 o'clock was taken up, which was S B 159, to abolish the tax fees of Attorneys charged in bills of cost in civil suits.

This bill was referred to the Judiciary Committee a few days since, and the bill called back to the Senate with a recommendation that it do not pass.

The bill called forth one of the most spirited debates of the session, lasting nearly two hours. A number of Senators participated pro and con.

Mr. Henderson offered an amendment to the original bill, which was defeated by a vote of 34 to 8.

The bill was then put upon its second reading, and the bill passed second reading by a vote of 35 to 5.

Mr. Robinson moved to suspend the rules and put it on its final reading. Carried. The bill then passed its final reading.

Mr. Williamson, the introducer, moved to reconsider the vote by which the bill passed its final reading, and lay on the table. Carried.

On motion of Mr. Taylor, the Senate adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.
