LOCAL BRIEFS.

—To be church to-day.

—The embankments on Fayetteville street have not been touched yet.

—Regular meeting of Wm. G. Hill Lodge, No. 218, to-morrow evening at 7 o'clock.

—The city continues very quiet, and there is almost a complete absence of any street news.

—Drummers' licenses were yesterday issued to Price, Kolinger & Co., and Grace & Muellers, Baltimore.

—The dogs that roam the streets at night are becoming a great nuisance and trying to the nerves of timid pedestrians.

—There is a good deal of sickness in the city, mostly owing to the sudden changes in the weather, a typhoid fever.

—Work on the new fire cisterns has begun, and the city engineers have some protection from an ever present danger.

—Don't fail to attend the closing sale of books at auction Monday night at J. D. Newson's old stand Fayetteville street.

—Telegrams are held for Chas. J. White and E. H. Brown, member of the Legislature some boarding house sends the address.

—A feminine stroler of cabbage was captured yesterday while vending her prizes in market yesterday, and placed in the guard house.

—The Governor, Treasurer, a Legislature committee, and some other persons, paid a visit to the Insane Asylum yesterday.

—Cotton was firm yesterday, and the receipts were light. The business of the roads must present much from being brought in.

—There will be services at the Pentecostal Sabbath school at 2:15 this afternoon. Members of the Legislature who desire to attend are invited to do so by the Superintendent.

—The ladies had a nice time at the skating rink last afternoon as it was thrown open for their amusement by the clever manager, Mr. E. H. Lee, and a great number partook.

—The government building is much improved as to its interior by the beautiful new furniture. The court room is being elegantly fitted up and will be ready by the next term of the Circuit Court.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.—The Board met on Friday night, for the transaction of the regular monthly business.

—The only matter which received attention were accounts, etc., during the month.

—The Board concluded to adjourn until Tuesday evening and conclude the work at that time.

SUPPORT OF LUNATICS.—The total sum of \$1,486.65 was drawn from the State Treasury by the following counties yesterday, for the support of their insane outside of the asylum. So the drain continues, day by day. Camden drew \$200; Gaston, \$700; Madison, \$100; Yancey, \$100; Polk, \$286.65. The eyes of the retrenchers will be opened at this, no doubt.

WAKE CRIMINAL COURT.—A good deal of work was done at the last term of the Criminal Court of this county. The terminated really only eight days. In that time there were thirty-five convictions and submissions. As will be seen there were five arrests sentenced to the penitentiary, while eight went to the workhouse. There were also a number of fines imposed. The docket was cleaned and the work done, as the saying goes, with neatness and dispatch.

GOOD TRADE.—Yesterday was spoken of by many merchants as very busy and trade was good as to be quite a surprise. The farmers are already beginning preparations for their spring work. There seems to be a considerable cropfulness among the agriculturists. Most of these, as has been stated, will go more largely into the raising of grain and grasses than ever before. They have determined upon this course they say as an necessity, and last year's good work will be improved on.

FOR THE PENITENTIARY.—Wake county yesterday gave the State a half dozen hands for the great work of internal improvements, by turning over to the tender care of the Penitentiary authorities the following, all of whom were convicted at the last term of the Criminal Court: Sam Ayers, larceny, six years. Chesley Bass, larceny and receiving, one year. Isaac Hill, all as piece, larceny and receiving, four years. John Watson, larceny and receiving, two months. Scott Uley, larceny and receiving, one year. Henry Horton, larceny and receiving, eighteen months.

FUNERAL OF MRS. THOMAS.—The funeral services of Mrs. Evie Briggs Thomas, wife of Capt. J. J. Thomas were held from the Salisbury Street Baptist Church yesterday morning.

SENATE. SATURDAY, FEB. 8TH.

The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock, President Robinson in the Chair.
