That the contract is made in another State is shown in this: That every policy is signed by the President and Secretary of the contracting company, and is only valid when so signed: that the conditions of the p licy-contract are all made and printed, and signed by the officers of the company before sent to the local agent; that the authority of the latter extends only to filling in the proper blanks with the name of the party here who accepts the contract (called the insured,) and describing the property; and that such tract, nor have any authority to aller or change any of its terms.
