OUR LAW MAKERS.

SENATE. FRIDAY, FEB. 21, 1879.

The Senate met at 10 a. m., President Robinson in the chair.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, the county of Caswell, inadvertently omitted yesterday, was added to the provisions of the bill to prevent live stock from running at large in the counties of Rowan and Cabarrus.

Mr. Seales presented the petition of sundry citizens of Alamance against the enactment of a stock law.

Reports of committee were presented by Messrs. White, Bryan, of Pender, Mize, Davidson, Henderson, Lyon, Alexander, Epper, Redwine, Shackelford and Nicholson.

Mr. Bynum from the Committee on the Asylum for the Insane, presented a report accompanied by a bill, which were ordered to be printed.

On motion of Mr. Bynum, the committee to ascertain the number of bills now before the General Assembly, of public importance, reported that there were on file in both branches some seventy of such bills, and in the hands of committees probably as many more.

The committee propose to report fully tomorrow.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS. Mr. Repass, bill to incorporate the Ocean Fire Company of the town of Washington, Beaufort county.

Mr. Graham, of Lincoln, (by a request) to regulate the penal bonds of certain officers.

Mr. Mize, to authorize the State Treasurer to pay to the authorities of Pitt county the sum due for the maintenance of certain outside lunatics.

Mr. Snow, a bill in relation to the county of Johnston.

On motion of Mr. Bell, the rules were suspended, and the bill to authorize the Commissioners of Craven to fund the county debt and to issue bonds passed its third reading.

FEES OF JAILORS. Mr. Henderson reported from the Committee of Conference on the bill to regulate the fees of jailors, and the report was concurred in.

On motion of Mr. Evratt, Senate bill to revise the charter of the town of Fayette, Fayette county, passed its third reading.

CALENDAR. House resolution to pay the engrossing and enrolling clerks the same per diem as the principal clerks of the Assembly, was concurred in.

On motion of Mr. Evratt, Senate bill to incorporate the Bank of Asheville, Buncombe county, Enrolled.

Senate bill to prevent gambling in railroad cars. Enrolled.

Senate bill to amend the act to prevent obstruction to the navigation of New River, Carteret county. Enrolled.

Senate bill relative to the public roads of Mecklenburg county passed its second reading and went to the calendar.

The bill to define the jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace was made the special order for Wednesday next at 11 a. m.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. FRIDAY, FEB. 21, 1879.

Mr. Speaker Moring called the House to order, and Rev. J. M. Atkinson, D. D., offered a prayer.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES. were submitted by Messrs. Woodhouse, Armstrong, Jones, Ford, Richardson, of Columbus, Colwell, B. C. Cooke, Clarke, English and Covington.

RESOLUTIONS. were introduced by Messrs. Angier, Turner, Clarke and Anderson.

BILLS. were introduced by Messrs. Davis, of Caswell, Reid, of Macon, Gatling, Orchard, Colwell, Armstrong, Hines and Lockhart.

CALENDAR. Bill to provide for keeping in repair the public roads of the State, passing their control in the hands of the Justices of the Peace of each township.

This bill was discussed by Messrs. Best, Barringer and Vaughan. One provision is that no person shall be required to work more than ten days per year on the roads. This Mr. Vaughan opposed, as did Mr. Amis, because some counties require as much as 30 days work.

Remarks were also made by Messrs. Anderson, Davis, of Haywood, Cooke and Blocker.

Mr. Ellison offered an amendment exempting ministers of the gospel from road duty. This provoked a discussion, but it was voted down. The bill then passed its second reading.

Bill to amend the construction of the Winston, Salem & Moravia Railroad, passed its second reading.

Bill in relation to the city of Wilmington. Co. continues the time of the present city officers.

Mr. Seale spoke against the bill, and Mr. Jones in its favor.

The bills were further discussed by Messrs. Jones, Clarke, Scott, Laub, Ellison and Hines.

Mr. Jones moved that the bill be made the special order for Wednesday, and upon that called the yeas and nays, but it did not prevail. The vote then recurred upon the passage of the bill on its second reading, when it went through by a large majority.

Bill to amend the calendar was placed at the Speaker's disposal, when the following business was transacted:

Bill to lay out and construct a public road in Alleghany and Wilkes, passed.

Bill to reimburse Harnett county, for the support of outside lunatics, was tabled.

Bill to reimburse Perquimans county for the same, was severally likewise.

Bill in relation to charges by commission merchants on sales of produce, not read and properly incurred, passed its second reading, after some discussion.

Bill to authorize the county of Bladen to fund its floating debt, passed.

Resolution requiring the Secretary of State to furnish the names of all persons who have been appointed to the office of Justice of the Peace, passed.

At 2 p. m. the House adjourned.

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THE FRAUD'S CAREER.

Every additional development in the investigation of the great American Presidential steal is but a new phase of a well established and colossal fact.

It is but another shake of a kaleidoscope which centers in the Presidential election, and whose unvarying result is a Presidential theft. This constant spectacle has become so revolting to even the party which has been robbed of its rights...

After the great Presidential fraud was consummated, to the disgrace of the Nation and the disgust of all honest men, Mr. Hayes added to the enormity of the crime by rewarding the thieves with public appointments.

He sealed according to their political usefulness. He made them judges, magistrates, and in his private purse bore the burden of the political campaign fund, but out of the public coffers, thus making the taxpayers an unwilling party to their own disgrace.

To say that he was forced to take the course in order to satisfy his selfish and avoid exposure, is no excuse. It merely proves that he was a particeps criminis before the fact, and that what he has done is merely the result of the criminal conspiracy.

But Mr. Hayes will have had at least the decency to have saved the country from the spectacle of his own nameless hypocrisy. While prostituting the public service to reward plunders, to build up a Hayes party, to punish political enemies and to subvert the public will at elections, he might have avoided a special cabinet about civil service reform.

While taking in his bosom the men most odorous of infamy, he might have dispensed with his so-called professors of administrative reform. While boasting in power the most unscrupulous swindlers of the Grant era, he might have reserved his announcement of hostility to graftism. But instead of this was

FIGURES AND FACTS.

Senator W. A. Graham, of Lincoln, made an effective speech on Tuesday in behalf of his bill for the reduction of salaries and fees.

He brought out some facts and figures that are worth considering, and made some declarations that are too good to be forgotten.

He gave, in tabular form, the expenses of the State government in 1860 and 1878. In the former year the expenses were \$1,430, in the latter \$174,331.

Senator Graham's speech shows familiarity with the points at hand, and it will be difficult to meet them. If men who favor high salaries would deal in arguments and facts rather than in explosive epithets they would do a great deal more towards satisfying the wishes of the people.
