The father of the Bill and his friends seem to be ignorant of the fact, that an Insurance Policy is simply a contract, based upon a survey and application made by the assured, who fixes the values, that the agent, who secur s the Insurance acts as the agent of the applicant, that the policy promises to pay loss or damage that may be caused by fire, at its value immediately preceding the fire, and not when the application was made, and they overlook another fact, that Insurance agents have no anthority to change the conditions of a policy to suit such laws as are proposed without the previous consent of the Company they represent, and therefore, such a law would be inosperative, as no Company appreciating the indemnity promised by its policies would consent to such changes. We hope, here ore, that our Legislature will not enact any law calculated to force the Insurance Companies to retire from North Carolina, and so serious'y inure, nay, destroy the business of Insurance Agents of this State. A large number of the Companies will stop the expense of filing and publishing their annual statements, until they are satisfied that no hostile legislation will be enacted.
