WASHINGTON, Feb. 24th. House, -The House has consuited in the Senate amendment to the tobacco bill, providing that the reduced tax on tobacco shall go into effect, May 1st. 1879, and now concurred in that amendment which strikes at the clause abolisting the tax on matches. 


