Robinson's Committee.

At the instance of Mr. James L. Robit son, Senator from Macon county, on the 1st day of March a commuttee was appeinted to inquire into the truth of a certain "report in circulation" to the effect that threats and promises were 'made, and improper and undue influ-"ences were used by certain parties in-"terested in the question of public "printing during the early part or this "session of the General Assembly, with "a view to control the votes of Senators and R-presentatives for or against "the interes s of the said parties inter-'ested in determining the quest on of public printing.

The Committee, consisting of Mersis Dortch, Snow and Ru us White, was appointed by Mr. Scales, having been alled to the chair for that purpose. Two witness is, who were supposed to be "interested in the printing," were examined. Walter Clark, of this city, a stickholder if the NEWS, was examineil. He affiimed most positively that he had no connection with the NEWS and not the remotest interest in the printing. This testimony stands unimpeached.

Mr. Geo. C. Jordan, one of the proprovers of the NEWS was examined. He was entribatic and pointed in his testimony, denying the use of any ", hreat or promise" to secure the printing He used only honorable men s and was assidu us in his efficies to secure votes.

Whether the success up caudi late for the printing made any "tireats or promises" or used any "undue milliences' is unknown

Whether Edwards & Broughton, a large printing house in this city, made any "threats or promises" or used any "undue influences" is unknown.

THE severe language used in yesterday's paper is no r.flection on Col. Clark. It does not appear that he made any "threats or promises" to influence the public printing by authority of the NEWS or that he assumed such authority in whatever action be had the Senate to do with the action may have taken in the premises.


