## The Educational Bill.

LONDON, March 20 .- The preface of M. Jules Ferrys education bul brought forward in the Chamber of Deputives. states that according to the existing law, foreigners are not allowed to teach in France, and declares that some exclusion should apply to an order essentially foreign by the character of its dectrines, nature and aim and its statutes.

The Paris correspondent of the Times remarks that this passage of course refers to Jesuits, who have 27 colleges in France with 848 teachers. Twenty six other communities hav-

ing 61 establishments and 1089 teachers are also unrecognized by the State and they will consequently be deprived by the bill of the right of teaching. It is presumed that if the bill pass s disqualified orders will transfer their establishments to those recognized by the law but there will be a bitter struggle before the clause become, a law.
