EXECUTION OF TWO NEGROES IN VIR-GINIA FOR A MURDER OF THE BIGH-

TUNSTALLA, Va., March 25 -Patrick Smith and Julius Christian, two negroes convicted of the murder of John C. Lacy (white) on J.nuary 17 last. were hanged to-day at New Kent County Court-House, About 2,000 people were present, mostly whites, but quite a number being colored womer. The prisoners had been confined in Henrico County Jail, in Richmond, the New Kent Prison having been burned some months ago by a prisoner at Law. who lost his life in an altempt to escape by this means. They w re transported this morning by way of the York River Railroad to Summit Station, where a guard of about thirty well-armed mounted men awaited to escort them to the County Court-House. The prisoners displayed to the very end the utmost ind flerence as to their approaching fate.
