## JOHN B. HUSSEY. PRODUCERS OF TORACUO.

A case of interest to producers of tobacco was decided in the United States District Court, Boston, Mass., last week. One James Stetson was indicted and convicted for selling leaf tobacco of his own raising without a license. It appears that Stetson-and his practice was common with the neighbors, also-traded his crop for dry goods, groceries, and other matters of domestie use. In other words, he paid his rent, store bills and grocery bills with leaf tobacco. There was no imputation of any design to cheat or defraud the Government. The practice was the result of ignorance. The 3244th section of the United States Statutes. under which the conviction of Stetson

was had, resuls: "Dealers in leaf tobacco, except retail dealers in leaf tobacco, as herein after defined, shall pay \$25. Every person shall be regarded as a dealer in leaf tobacco, whose business It is, for himself or on commission, to selle or offer for sale, or consign for sale on commission, leaf tobacco, and payment of special tax as dealer in tobacco, manufacturer of tobacco, manufacturer of cigars, or of his own production, or tobacco re-ceived by him as rent from his tenants, who has produced the same on his land; provided that nothing in this section shall be construed to exempt from special tax any farmer or planter who, peddling or otherwise, sells leaf tobacco at retail directly to consumers, or who sells, assigns, consigns, transfers, or disposes of to persons other than those who have paid a special tax as leaf dealers or manufacturers of tobacco, snutt or cigars, or to persons purchasing leaf tobacco for export,

By this law it will be seen by the grower of tobacco is confined within very narrow limits, if he sells without a license. He can only sell to a manufacturer. If he sells his crop direct to the consumer, he becomes a retail dealer, and must pay a special tax.

### CIVIL SERVICE REFORM (7)

The evidence of Gorham, the Secretary of the Republican Executive Com mittee, before the Wallace Committee is edifying reading from the civil-service reform point of view. The assessing of Government employees for political purposes has been positively forbidden by statute, but the Republican Committee seems to have considered the statute a sort of joke and their liberty of action complete. # THE VIRGINIA STATE DEBT.

The Virginia State debt has at last been settled by the passage of the Mc-Culloch bill. Registered and coupen bonds are to be issued, dated January 1, 1879, the principal payable in 1919, with interest at three per cent. for ten years, four per cent. for the next twenty years, and five per cent. for the last ten years. The State has the option to redeem any or all of the bonds by paying the principal and accrued interest at any time after the expiration of ten years from January 1, 1879. The coupons will be receivable at maturity for all taxes and dues of the State, and the bonds and coupons are non-taxable. This settlement has been violently opposed by a party known as the Forcible Readjusters, who objected to any rate of interest greater than three per cent, and to the tax-receivable feature of the coupons. They prevented the passage of the bill during the regular session of the Legislature, thus making an extra session necessary at an expense of \$40,000 to the embarrassed treasury of Virginia, and this too when they were pretending that the State could not afford to pay the interest on

In several of the States it is absolutely prohibited by constitutional provisions, but there is not only no constitutional prohibition against it in the Federal Constitution, but it is sanctioned and regulated by the House. It is a matter exclusively within the discretion and judgment of the House, under its rules, whether it shall pass each bill on its own merits, or combine several measures of a similar character in one bill and thus "log-roll" the whole

The practice of tacking matters of legislation upon appropriation bills has become so common, and has been so generally adopted by the Republican party, especially while it had control of ongress, that it is safe to say that some other reason exists for it than is now arged against this mode of parliamenary procedure by the minority of this

SENATOR Whyte has introduced a bill in the Senate which will put an effectual stop to the highanded and revolutionary proceedings of such Federal Judges as Bond as Rives. 


