BY DILLARD, J. 119. Davis vs Moss, from Wilson. At the organization of an Inferior ourt in Sept. 1877 the Justices of the Peace declined to elect a Clerk but accepted the defendant the Clerk of the Superior Court as ex-officio clerk to the inferior Court, took his bond for two years and he entered into the discharge of his duties. The term of the the Superior Court Clerk expired in August 1878, (though re-elected) when the Jusices of the Peace elected the plaintiff, clerk of the Inferior Court. Held; The aght and duty of the defendant to disharge the duties of the clerk of the Inferior Court having begun as an inciden to the office of Superior Court terk did not depend on the continuince nor terminate with it.

It was admissible for the plain aff to offer in evidence judgments ob tained against the defendant, just before such sale, in a justice's court, and the assignment thereon of all the defenlant's property as exemptions, both to show the andisclosed insolvency and also as bearing upon the fraudulent in tent with which the purchase was made. and for the same reasons, it was proper for the court to allow the counsel to oniment upon the fact that the defenlant filed his petition in Bankrupter immediately after receiving the goods. it is not the judge's duty to declare the aw on a single selected fact, but to charge the law on the case as it was in reference to whole facts as the jury might find them, and it is no error to ter miles in four thousand consecutive refuse a specific request, when in his general charge the law on the point is aid down correctly.

BY SMITH, C. J. 121. Matthews vs. Copeland, from Northampton. Petition to rehear same case 79 N. C 493. An objection that a judgment is in excess of the plaintiff's demand is good but it can be cured by the plaintiff's consent to correct the judgment. The new system adopts the rule, which pre vails in a court of equity upon the overruling of a demurrer, and allows the defendant to answer over. But actions founded upon contracts made prior to the ratification of the C. C. P. are governed by the law existing before that date, sec. 8, par. 3, 4, C. C. P. 


