

These are timely suggestions the Washington Post makes to the Senate. Unless Democratic senators wish to do the Republican party a service, they will not prolong for a single hour debate upon the army bill, which will be sent over to the Senate from the House to-day. It is quite probable that Republican senators will consume all the time possible in denouncing it, but after all that can be said by them, not one additional fact will be contributed or a single argument advanced that has not already been heard. There is, therefore, no necessity to antagonize them.

The object of the Republicans is evident. They dream Executive action and its depressing influence upon them in the fight against the other repeat measures. Very few of them doubt that Hayes will approve of the army bill when presented to him, and about all the fight they can make is to keep the issue doubtful as long as they can. While it is an open question they can, by dint of dragging, screw up their courage to fight in the House for the marshals and supervisors. At the moment the army bill is signed, that moment their defense line is broken and a rout follows.

The Democratic Senate should take the position that the army bill has been thoroughly discussed and announce a continuous session until it is disposed of. In that event it could be laid before the fraudulent Executive by Tuesday or Wednesday. This is just the programme that the Republicans would not like to see adopted, and for that reason just the programme that should be adopted without a dissenting Democratic voice.

DIPHTHERIA is prevailing to a remarkable extent all over the world. In this country it has exhibited itself in a malignant form north, south, east and west. It has shown itself in nearly every country of Europe, and in Russia its ravages have been more fatal than in any other country. This disease, which rarely occurs except as an epidemic, has only been known in this country within the last twenty-five years, except in the way of occasional sporadic cases. It has not yet been settled whether the disease is communicable by infection or contagion, or whether the parasitic fungus frequently found in the false membrane is the cause of the disease or only its product.

The revised Bible which the English scholars have been fixing up, it is said will show that our King James' revision is full of interpolations and false construction, and errors of kinds. It is feared by many pious persons that this new revision will have a tendency to weaken the belief in the inspiration of all scripture. The change from the old to the new Bible will be very marked indeed so marked that many passages in our present word of God will be omitted altogether. There is quite a difference of opinion among church men as to the advisability of issuing this new revision, now that it is completed. There is no dispute about its being much more accurate than King James' which it is intended to supplant.

The Philadelphia doctors have called the attention of the police authorities to the spectacle of a "woman show," now before the public in that city. By the terms of the watch in which the women are engaged, they must make four thousand quarter miles in four thousand consecutive quarter hours, and for that extended period these women can never get a good sleep since even at the best strategy on the part of their attendants they can never be off the course for more than twenty minutes at any one time. The physicians very properly suggest that the police put a stop to this cruel exhibition.

If the present rush of negro emigration to Kansas continues, in twelve months from now a similar pledge will be passing around in that State against the employment of negro labor.

Digest Supreme Court Opinions. Reported for the News by Walter Clarke Esq., Attorney at Law.

By DILLARD, J. 117. Wadsworth vs. Carroll from Craven. The court adheres to the rule laid down in Wadsworth vs. Carroll, 75 N. C. 115, and will not admit a writ where it appears that the Appellate Bond was not filed in ten days, but with leave to the appellant to move for a certiorari, and bring up the case, on laying proper grounds therefor.

118. Ethier vs. Vannoy, from Bertie. A purchaser of land sold under a decree of court, if there arise a partial defect of the ask an abatement of the bid or if he has paid in the money, ask a return of a proportionate part of it, and this though the purchaser knew of the existence of the adverse claim, and with such knowledge had the sale confirmed.

119. Davis vs. Moss, from Wilson. At the organization of an Inferior Court, the clerk of the Justice of the Peace declined to elect a Clerk but accepted the defendant the Clerk of the Superior Court as ex-officio clerk to the Inferior Court, took his oath for two years and he entered into the discharge of his duties. The term of the Superior Court Clerk expired in August 1878, and the clerk of the Inferior Court having begun as an incident to the office of Superior Court clerk did not depend on the continuance of the term of the Superior Court.

120. Wilson vs. White, from Mecklenburg. In any case, or coupled with a pre-conceived purpose of not paying for the goods, is not sufficient to render the contract voidable at the option of the seller. But when in addition to these elements, the purchaser misrepresents his financial condition, or misleads the seller, there is sufficient to set aside the sale, making a fraudulent intent and rendering a voidable contract. TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS DAMAGES. A Notorious Jury Gives a Ten-Thousand Verdict Against the Danville Road for the Loss of a Boy's Leg. Special telegram to the Dispatch.

PATRICK vs. VA., April 5.—Last May a white boy, named Leslie Morton, while playing with other children on the turn-table of the R. & D. Railroad at Burkeville was so badly crushed that his leg was amputated. His father, through his attorney, at this time of Nottoway Circuit Court for damages, laying them at \$25,000.
