A SOURCE OF WEALTH.

But the use of this invaluable substance is so limited, considering its great value, that at first glance the comparative ignorance of the farmers is given as a cause. The query naturally is made, cannot this manure be put at such prices as to give it that general use which it so well deserves. Cannot the railways transport it at such low rates as to enable if to be put at prices which will not prove so distressing to the farmers? As matters now are, the farmer hypothecates his cotton for his absolutely void, they brying no jurisspring fertilizers, and he is by the plain terms of his contract required to deliver to the dealer with whom the contract is By SMITH, C. J. made the first cotton produced in the fall. Thus he is always reduced in funds, and his labor seems well nigh profitless. This bad condition of affairs could be speedily set to rights, and the farmer relieved from the pressure which now bears him down, if our own fertilizers were used. The money for the fertilizers really goes to the North after all, at the present, where as in the proposed condition of affairs, it would be spent in our own State, and benefit in all ways, our own people. This question of the use of mari, is one which should receive now, especially, the fullest attention from practical men. By the introduction of this fertilizer the State will be the gainer by more than a million dollars per annum.


