Examination of the test oath act has convinced the President, we are gravely informed, that "the act itself involves very much more than the simple question of the ironclad oath administered to jurors. The causes of disqualification and challenge of grand and petit refers not only to persons who have been in rebellion against the tiovernment of the United States, but applies to those who are about to resist with force of arms the execution of the laws of the United States. With that oath repealed, it would be impossible to punish a violation of the United States laws in many parts of the South, as juries would be apt to be composed of the confederates of the indicted persons. And so we go.

The Legislature, at its last session, made an annual appropriation o go towards defraying the expenses of maintenance. But, owing to the ack of funds in the Treasury this is not available, and so the Asylum is in immediate need of donations. The e are now at the institution 128 children, nearly every county in the State being represented. The health of the pupils has been admirable, and there has been no sickness at all this year. The buildings, which were somewhat injured by tire some months past, have been put in thorough repair, and coated with fire proof point. A new building is seing erected in agrove by the spring, o be used as a hospital in case of sickness. There are at present five teachers at the Asylum, all ladies. One of hese was raised in the Institution and afterwards graduated at Greensboro Female College. There have recently been some changes in the corps of teachers. Miss Long, of Randolph, has been succeeded by Miss Everett, of

Goldsboro. Miss Fife, of Thomasville, succeeds Miss Clewell, of Salem, and Miss Jeffreys, of Virginia, takes the place of Miss Jordan, of Roxboro, Tie Asylum is admirably managed, and the pupils are carefully looked after. They show great progress as scholars. one of the orphans has been at Chowan Institute nearly four years, the Asylum furnishing books and clothing. she will graduate in June and return to the Asylum as a teacher. The benefits of this institution are invaluable. and its adva tages are a Godsend to every child in its walls. Only orphans, or children of widows who are unable to support them, are taken in charge, When a widow marries, her children are sent back to her at once. A lady who had children there said that she wished to marry, but preferred to remain solitary rather than take away her child. 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
