Every person required to list property must make out and deliver to the township assessor a statement, verified by oath, of all the real and personar property, moneys, credits, investments n bonds, stocks, joint stock companies, annuities or otherwise, in his or her possession or under his or her control on the 1st day of June, either as owner or holder thereof, or as parent, husband, guardian, trustee, executor, administrator, receiver, accounting officer, partner, agent, factor or otherwise. at the Grand Jury room and list.
