THE DEAD LOCK IN CONGRESS COMING TO AN END.

It is quite certain that the long contest between Congress, backed by the Democrats on the one hand contending for free and fair elections and honest jury trials, and the President on the other hand, backed by the Republicans contending for the power of supervising elections and controlling the ballotbox by the bayonet and for packed juries, is nearing its end. While the Demograts are not able to obtain for the people all they desire, they have made a noble struggle and made the issue full and distinct. If the programme that is now proposed is carried out, there will be no back down, and all will be accomplished that is possible until an appeal can be submitted to the people. The cry of back down, and like expressions, are the arguments of impracticables. The Democrats have not a twothirds majority in Congress, and it must be plain to every sensible man that they cannot oversome the President's veto. The protraction of the session is becoming painful to the people; but Congress, if it acts wisely, will not adjourn without passing the appropriations made necessary by laws stready on the statute books. The counsels of wise and prudent men are obtaining favor. We see that a committee of such men as Thurman, Sauisbury, Vance and Bailey, on the part of lot. the Senate, and Chalmers, Springer, Ewing and Atkins, on the part of the House, have marked out a plan which is wise and patriotic, and there is hitle doubt that it will be adopted.

The army bill, pure and simple, will be passed, but it will withhold supplies for transporting troops to the polls or to keep the peace at elections. The legislative, judicial and executive appropriation bill will pass pure and simple; but so appropriation will be made for supervisors and deputy marshals. Congress has a right to direct how the money appropriated shall be used, but Congress must appropriate the money necessary to carry on the government. It is not necessary, in vindicating the rights of the people, to destroy the government. The Democratic party must save the liberties of the people and save the government also. To do this an appeal must be made to the people, and the people, if they have not already lost their love of free government, will protect their liberties, save the government and exalt the Democratic party by placing its leaders in command.



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ACQUITTAL OF HON. NOBLE A. HULL

In a speech, delivered in Gorman Hall in the city of Washington before the Southern Radical Association of that city, immediately after the assembling of the extra session of the NLVIth Congress by Hon. J. J. Martin, who claims to represent the first district of South Carvin ann wir min dry mr. ida upon the prima facia case, Hull, having the Governor's certificate, just as Martin had.

In denouncing Hull, Martin was represented by the Washington Republican, as saying that Hull was indicted for a crime in Florida, growing out of the late election; and that he believed and hoped that Hull would be convicted, and sent to the penitentiary.

Mr. Martin only expressed the universal wish of the Radical party in that ill-timed and violently abusive speech, and there can be no doubt, that it was the deliberate purpose of the Radicals to convict Hull, and send him to the penitentiary, so as to prevent the State of Florida's casting a Democratic vote in case the election for President in 1880, should be sent to the House. It is with peculiar pleasure that we announce that Mr. Hull has been acquitted. Base and false charges were trumped up. A Radical grand jury of

a Federal court indicted him, an unscrupulous Radical partisan district attorney prosecuted him and a prejudiced partisan Federal Judge by the name of Thomas Settle presided, and a Republican petit jury acquitted him. We experience great pleasure in this result. Of course our Mr. Martin, who had prejudged the case that he was to act on as a judge, is greatly disappointed at this just result, as well as the other Radicals whose plans have come to naught.

Having made so successful a tight, when the odds and combinations were to great against him, we can but hope that Mr. Hull will be victorious in his next encounter, which will be before the House when his seat is contested by the notorious carpet bagger, Horatio Bisbee.




