#### **Death of George Bishop**;

This community was shocked at the and announcement of the sudden death of Mr. George Bishop yesterday about noon. He was an estimable young man and had a large circle of friends and acquaintances in this city. It was not known that he had a single enemy. He was universally admired and loved by all who knew him. Coming to the city a stranger in October, 1873, he entered the drug store of Mr. William Simpson as prescription clerk. He was devoted to his profession and to the interest of his employer, who was greatly attached to him and placei every confidence in him, often entrusting his entire business to his care By unremitting attention and a constant desire to tearn, Mr. Bishop soon acquired a high reputation as a chemist He was not excelled in this city. What popularity he had acquired was due entirely to merit. His antereleuis were never inquired into.

It seems that he had been in declining health for some time past, and i was deemed necessary to have a surgical operation performed as a last resort. This was done Thursday at 1. m., and promised to be most successful, the doctor congratulating him apon his fine prospects for speedy recovery. It was therefore a great shock to his many friends when his death was announced at 1:30 p. m. yesterday, just twenty-four hours after this operation. His father, a prominent merchant of New Berne, arrived here last night. and leaves with the remains this morning, accompanied by Messrs. Leo. D. Heartt and W. A. Lodge, who go as far as Goldsboro, there to be met by an escort from the New Berne Lodge of Knights of Pythias, of which order he was an honored member. The New Berne lodge will take charge of the funeral ceremonies.


