THE following accounts for the circulation of the Okolona States:

Mr. J. C. McMurphy, of Marton, Linn county, Iowa, has been amusing himself by subscribing for a copy of the Okolona States and passing it around among his Damocratic friends, he being himself a stanch Republican.

This is the first time I was ever forbidden to enter a diningroom of a hotel. I refused to have my breakfast sent up to me, and said I pre ferred going to a restaurant. I shall leave here immediately and find a house where I can be treated like a gen-

THE Hon. Charles Foster, Governorelect of Ohio, has been interviewed. He states that General Ewing's mistake was in underrating the aggregate vote likely to be cast. He rated it at 650,000, while Mr. Foster's estimate was 675,-000, "Taking that as a basis he was able to cipher out his own success by counting the voters returned by the Democratic canvassers as certain to go for him. He underestimated the strength of the Republican reserves. which were all brought out by our vigorous campaign." He is also of the opinion the result of the election has practically killed Senator Thurman so far as the Presidential race is concerned. It is now plainly perceived by everybody that neither he nor any other Democrat can hope to earry Ohio. It affects Mr. Tilden's prospects very favorably. "In my opinion it removes Tilden's most formidable competitor, Judge Thurman, altogether from the field, and makes New York the pivotal State of the campaign. Tilden's powers of organization are perfectly wonderful, and it seems to me the result of our election has greatly improved his chances."

warm friends in the ranks of the New York Republicans is well known. It has been evident for some time, judging from the expressions made by men of high standing in the party, Subjoined is Vice-President Wheeler's words on the subject :

I did not advocate the nomination of Mr. Cornell. I believed that, owing to complications growing out of the New York custom-house, another man would command more votes, but a mame, and bowing always to the principle which underlies our form of tiovernment. I cheerfully accepted its decision. Cornell now carries the flag of the Unton upon the skirmish line for New York's position in the great fight next year. I follow that flag wherever I see its folds, whoever may be the standardbearer, and from the position gained by New York on the 4th of November next she will lead the storming column in 1880, and float the banner of the Republican party upon the ramparts of the fortress of the Democrats.

These are brave words, but to what do they amount? Mr. Conking a year ago was at variance with the Administration about this same Mr. Cornell. The Saratoga Convention indorsed Mr. Conkling and flouted Mr. Hayes. The Republican nominee for Governor of the State on which depends Republican success in 1850 has to be indersed by the Republican Administration, although it is a clear case of "raw crow," and it may safely be assumed that the weight of influence, including the custom house, exerted in favor of Mr. Cornell will not be very great. THE NEW YORK ELECTION.

On Tuesday next, one week from to-day, occurs the New York election. Undoubtedly the largest vote ever polled in that State will appear. There are several reasons why it should be so; one is, that for the first time in its history every State office outside the judiciary is to be tilled, from the tioyernor down to the members of the lower house of the Legislature. This fact in itself would tend to bring out all the wotes, but there is more than this depending on it: it is really a fight for the

The parties as now arrayed against each other are under the leadership of Samuel J. Tilden and Roscoe Conkling respectively. Each count on the capture of that State as a claim for the nomination by the respective conventions. Whichever party wins in 1880 must win New York. If Governor Robinson is re-elected Mr. Tilden's chances are assured. If he is defeated, and the remainder of the ticket is elected, Mr. Tilden might as well give

up the fight. The election of Mr. Cornell means Mr. Conkling's fight in the next Republican Convention. He can then lay sound claim to his ability to carry New York. But there are certain things that militate against him in this campaign. It is well known that Mr. Cornell was the bone of contention between Mr. Conkling and the present Administration, and when the latter pushed his arrogant claims in favor of Cornell he alienated many who had before stood by him through thick and thin. These men were not mere politicians; they were men who fought for what they understood to be a principle, and felt indiguant that one of their trusted leaders should attempt to throw out one of the best planks of their platform, civil service reform, and undertake to make the President a tool for carrying

out his scheme, Mr. Conkling had ample warning; a third of the press of the State denounced his attempt in unmeasured terms. The Presidential title was clouded. It was hoped that Mr. Hayes' course would be such as to conciffate his political foes, and that in this he would receive the hearty support of the Republican leaders. Mr. Conkling saw fit to run counter to this desire. He was under obligations to Mr. Cornell and he imagined he saw a chance to pay this debt, strengthen his his position, and make himself the acknowledged leader of his party. Herein he failed. He has bided his time. By Democratic folly he has recovered his lost ground, and means to take the position he sought to reach a year ago and earry Cornell with him to make his victory complete. It remains to be seen if he can do It. Some of the prominent men of that party have openly denounced Mr. Cornell's nomination -such men as George William Curtis, William E. Dodge, David Dows, and many prominent merchants who were not particularly enchanted with Mr. Cornell's course while in the custom house; they assert that the Saratoga convention was packed and there was not a fair expression. The movement is spreading and may seriously interfere with Mr. Conkling's plans. If Mr.

chances in 1880 are exceedingly dim. To offset this defection is the Tammany boit. It is understood to be an alliance with the Republicans to defeat Governor Robinson, thereby meaning Mr. Tilden. 




