RUSSIAN-TURKISH WAR.

Latest Telegraphic Advances from the Seat of War.

LONDON, June 2.—A Times correspondent at Paris says: "It is now well known that the difficulties of the situation are, Russia can only escape the more threatening consequences of her undertaking by promptly and energetically limiting it."

A correspondent in Vienna states that the reported capture of Andran is believed in that city. It was effected, it is alleged, by the former garrison, who had unexpectedly turned back, and taking the Russians unawares, made a sudden dash on the town and succeeded in dislodging the Russian.

LONDON, June 2.—A leading article in the Times says: "Little war news has reached us within the last few days. There are vague reports of improbable events. There are rumors, such as continually arise during a war, of a disposition to negotiate, but the campaign in its main features is not marked by any incidents."
