The South Carolina Election Cases

CHARLESTON, April 22 .- At the opening of the United States Circuit Court this morning Judge Bond instructed the jury charged with the trial of the Barnwell county election conspiracy cases, to bring in a verdict of not guilty on the ground of a defect in the information. The informs tion consisted of five separate counts. The first four counts charged that T. Transrsers, with other persons unknown, conspired to prevent Fred Nix, colored, and others who were qualified voters, from meeting peaceably in consultation in respect to public affairs and the immunity granted to them by the United States. The fifth count charged that T. Transresers conspired to injure and oppress Nix in the exercise of a right to vote at a federal election on account of his race and color.

The first four counts of the information, the Judge held could not be maintained the Judge held could not be maintained because they contained no allegation that the parties alleged to have been interfered with had been molested on account of their race or color. The fifth count, he said, while it charged an offence under the Statute that is the right to vote at an election without distinction of race or color, there had been no proof offered to sustain. The jury, accordingly, brought in a verdict of not guilty.

cent say that Lord Chelmsford's camp at Girglilova, on the road to Ekowe, was attacked at day break on April 3, by 11,000 Zulus, who made frequent and desperate attacks on all'sides, but were repulsed and pursued with great loss. Four hundred and seventy-one Zulus were found dead round the trenches. The final attack was lead by Dobulmanzi, who commanded at Izandula. Johnson, of the ninety-ninth regiment, and four privates were killed. Colonel Northey, of the sixtieth regiment, a surgeon and fifteen men were severely wounded. Col. Crealock, Major Barron and ten men were wounded.
