## FORTY-SIXTH CONGRESS.

Washington, May 3.—House.—Mr. Davidson, of Fiorida, called attention to the speech of Mr. Russell, of North Carolina, as printed in the Record, though not delivered, and pronounced some of its statements as wholly and absolutely un-true. He added that the flippant manner in which members charged fraud on others was altogether unbecoming the station which they occupied. To which Mr. Reed, of Maine, responded sarcastically, "that 18 80."

At the expiration of the morning hour the House resumed the consideration of the bill reported from the Coinage Committee amending the Statutes relating to coinage and coin certificates.

Mr. Warner, of Ohio, offered an amendment providing that gold and silver bullion which shall become the property of the Government by the return of the certificates to the Treasury in payment of dues thereto, shall be coined and paid out the same as other money. He made an argument in support of his substitute, after which Mr. Claffin, of Massachusetts, obtained the floor and the House adjourned, whereupon a Democratic caucus was announced to be held forthwith.

### Democratic Caucus.

Washington, May 3.—The House Democratic Caucus Committee met this morning and it is understood agreed upon measures to be submitted to the caucus, if concurred in by the Senate Committee, which under the title of a bill to prevent military interference at the polls, consists of the sixth section of the vetoed army appropriation bill, with the words civil officers stricken out, and a proviso added hat nothing in the bill shall be construed as preventing the use of the army to enforce the process of the U. S. Courts or to viction that he had obeyed the Divite put down resistance against the United

The Democratic members of the House to-day held another caucus, and after an hour's deliberation, definitely determined their line of action in tegard to the army appropriation bill, and agreed upon the exact terms of the measure to be separately passed in lieu of the sixth section; it be ing also agreed that all consideration of the remainder of the bill shall be deferred until this independent political measure shall have been acted upon by the President. It will provide in substance that sections 2,002 and 2,003 of the Revised tatutes shall not be construed as authorring the presence of United States soldiers at the polls except under orders of the President to repel armed enemies of the United States, or in pursuance of constitu tional requirements upon application of the Legislature of a State, or of the Governor when the Legislature cannot be convened. to repress domestic violence.

The bill will be accompanied by a short preamble of an argumentative nature, to determine the phraseology of which, and also to agree upon an effec tive title, consumed considerable time today. Among the titles suggested were the following: A bill to protect the ballotbox from military interference; a bill to prevent the army and navy from interfering with the freedom of elections; a bill to prevent the control of elections in States by the army and navy of the United States; and a bili to prevent the use of the army at the polls and to promote the free dom of elections. It is understood that the title finally adopted is a bill to prevent interference by the army with elections. The action taken by the caucus is substantially in accordance with an amended report presented to day by the committee, to whom the whole project was recommitted yesterday. The proceedings are said to have been characterized by a spirit of har mony and good feeling.

### The South American War.

PANAMA, May 3.-The Lima advices of the 9th ultimo say the greatest en thusiasm was manifested by all classes of people on the reception of the intelligence that Chili had officially declared war against Peru. On receipt of the news from Chili, M. Godoy, the Chihan Minister in Lima, demanded his passport from the Peruvian government, declaring that his mission had terminated, and in spite of the assurances of the au thorities that his person would be held inviolate, he decided to repair on board of the U.S. steamer Lackawanna, where he still continues. The President, on the 3d, issued a decree declaring the Republic in a state of war with Chili. A great majority of the Chilians, resident in Lima and Callao, took passage by the first steamer for Valparaiso. Private Indivi duals, from the wealthiest capitalists to the humblest artisans, hastened to offer their services and money to the Govern ment. Beneficent societies, clubs, reli gious corporations, philanthropic associa tions, university schools, foreign residents, and even the Chinese domiciled in Lima and Peru, thave placed their funds at the disposal of the Government. The foreigners have formed themselves into companies of home guards and their services were gladly accepted. Military movements are being actively continued. General Daza, President of Bolivia, was telegraphed to as soon as news reached Lima of the action of Chili, and is now en raute to the coast, via Corocoa and Tacha, with 5,000 well equipped troops. 




