Senator Thurman then addressed the Senate, and alluding to the clause of the ap propriation bill relating to the trial by jury and elections, he said : These matters had not been made the subject of a calm, deliberate senatorial debate, but of the most inflaminatory and unjustifiable attempt to array one portion of the people against the other, and to make sectional division in this country as permanent and enduring as the continent itself. If these provisions ought not on their merits to pass, why had not their defect been pointed out and condemned. 




