LONDON, July 12. - It is announced that the Prince of Wales, the Duke of Edinburgh, the Duke of Connought and the Crown Prince of Sweden will act as pallbearers at the funeral of the Prince Im perial to-day. don will be present at the funeral. In the French Senate on Friday the motion to pos pone the nomination of the committee on Jules Ferry's education bill because of the absence of the Bonapartists was resisted by M. Pelletin, (Republican) on the ground that they were not absent because of genuine sentiment of mourning on their part but had gode to England in-search of the pretender. The numination of the committee was eventually postponed till Tuesday next. LONDON, July 12. -The weather was fine but cool. Crowds of people dressed in mourning, including a large proportion of French, thronged the London railway stations as early as 6 o'clock this morning The entrance to the Camden House is draped with cream colored tapestry. In addition to the royal personages previously announced, the following have arrived to attend the funeral: Princess Beatrice, Princess of Wales, Prince Christian and Prince Ed ward, of Saxeweimar.

LONDON, July 12 .- The funeral of the Prince Imperial took place in accordance with the arrangements already announced. In addition to the notable personages here Ambassadors to England were present. A ondy of Paris workmen reviewed the cof fin previous to the funeral. It is estimajed that various sympathizers brought bouquets and wreathes sufficient to fill two vans to place on the grave. Madam Christina Nilsson Rouseou volunteered her services in the choir in the Church of St.

No new cases have been re ported, and the general impression is that the fever will not spread, but be confined to the families where it is at present ly cated. No change is reported in the condition of Judge Ray and his son. Both are very low and not expec ed to live.

The Fall River Strike.

FALL RIVER, MASS., July 13.-The mills have been filling up rapidly with spinners this week, and quite long delega tions arrive daily. S me of the new tofore mentioned, the Ressian and Danish comers are bought off or p renaded by the striking spinners to leave town, but there is no denying the fact that manufacturers are getting the best of the s rike so far as running mills is concerned. A manufacturer stated last night that after careful inquiry at all the mills he found that 43 per cent, of the spinning machinery in the city is in operation. Several of the mills have erected chesp boarding houses in the mili yard and the new comers are kept entirely free from strikers. Corporations have found little deliculty in filling up, and i is probable that pext week quite a number of mills will be running full time. Manu facturers also say that many of their new help have been accustomed to work longer hours, and can earn about \$6 per week and look upon their new position with short hours and wages paid here as deci ded betterment of their condition. Mem bers of the union are quite hopeful, and say they are quite confident of success They have considerable money in the treasury, and are constantly receiving out side aid, but the grounds on which they expect to succeed finally are hard to be seen by outsiders

The Storm in thio

CINCINNATI, July 12.-Advices from points in the interior and eastern portion of he State indicate that the s orm last eve oing was very severe, and in many instances the effects were disastrous. It approached Onio from the north and north west, but maintained a south and south eastern direction and seemed to have about spent its force when it reached a uthern Pennsylvania. At Mansfield the hardware store of P. Schall was unroofed and the roof carried a nundred and fifty feet, de molishing a barn and beer saloon. The Smith Opera House was partially unroofed. The damage to the crops will be very great At Degroff a number of houses were blown down, and the whole country cover ed with water and the crops leveled a West Salem. A young man was killed by a door striking him. At Jefferson two prominent business blocks and a numb rot dwellings were unroofed. At Cuyahoga Falls the walls of the residence of H B. Saxe were blown in upon the beds of the family. No one was fatally injured, how ever. All through the State the day has been intensely hot and the air very sultry and oppressive.
