Noon Report.

Foreign Items.

LONDON, July 23 .- The Globe and Echo this afternoon publish a statement that the government have received a telegram from Sir Bartle Treer announcing that Lord Chelmsford had defeated the Zulus under King Cettawayo with immense loss, and that the war was virtually over. The newspapers publishing the statement do not say whether the telegram came by way of Madeira or St. Vincent. The battle was fought on July 4th. The Zulus were variously estimated at from 10,000 to 20, 000 in number. They surrounded the British troops who formed into a hollow square. The Zulus charged the square on all four of its sides. After the Zulus were broken by the British fire they were pursued by cavalry and utterly routed. Lord Chelmsford burned and destroyed all

the military kraals and returned to his camp the same evening. A Paris dispatch to the Times says the disunion of the Bonapartists is becoming dally more apparent. Some of them advocate the claims of Prince Victor, son of Prince Jerome Bonaparte. Others are only willing to accept Prince Jerome on certain conditions, and now M. Grainer DeCassagnac urges in the Pays that lin eage is nothing and that everything should depend upon the result of a plebescite. Yellow Fever in Louisville.

LOUISVILLE, July 23, -The health officers discovered two cases of yellow fever in this city yesterday afternoon, both of which were brought from Memphis. Mrs. Samuel Eckers, wife of a barber, who died in Memphis several days ago, and who came to Louisville on Sunday, is ill at the residence of a friend, on Story Avenue, in the eastern part of the city. The other case is that of Miss Essing, also a refugee from Memphis, who is residing with relatives on Portland Avenue. Both cases are of a mild type, and there is no excitement over their discovery. There are no cases of local origin in the city.

From Memphis.

MEMPHIS, July 23 .- Thirteen new cases were reported to the Board of Health this morning. Among them are J. L. Reister, wife and child and Ex-Chief of Police Thomas W. O. Donnell. One death occurred -Mrs. Delia Barry, in Mosley Street. Fever seems to be gradually spreading in the northern portion of the city and Chelsea, which, up to yesterday, had been exempt. Michael Athy, brother of Chief of Police Athy, was taken sick last night, and it is thought he bas fever. The citizens continue to leave the city in large numbers. The authorities are still looking about for a site to establish a camp.

The Zulu War.

London, July 23 -Lord Chelmsford continues to advance and his forces have reached an excellent position between Enadaengo and Utundi. The Zulu army had been observed leaving its bivousce about 7:30. An engagement was soon after commenced by mounted men, and by 9 o'clock the Zulu attack was fully de veloped. By 9:30 the enemy waivered and the Lancers, followed by the remainder of the cavalry, attacked them and a general rout ensued. The prisopers state that King Cettywayo was personally com-manding, and witnessed the fight from a neighboring kraal. They say 20,000 men participated in the attack. Lord Chelmsford estimates the Zulu loss to be not less than 1,000 men. Utundi was burning at noon. The steadiness of our troops, who at one time was surroun; ed by a co belt of fire, was remarkable. The dash and enterprise of the cavalry was all that could be wished.
