Foreign News.

LONDON, July 27.—In view of the approaching completion of the new French cable, the Anglo-American Cable Company has decided to lay a new cable next year.

Advices from Moscow announce that agrarian disturbances have broken out in various districts of Poland.

Nearly 800 engineers who are on a strike at Bradford, are about to emigrate to the United States and Canada.

St. Helena, July 27.—The Carthaginian and members of the British Mission arrived at the island on the 24th inst., and were received with brilliant military honors and salutes.

Yakob Khas replied in very friendly terms to a speech made by Maj. Cavendish on the 25th inst.

LONDON, July 27.—A Reuter dispatch from Constantinople represents that the crisis still continues. The latest indications are unfavorable to Kheiridin's remaining in power.

ALBANY, July 27.—The Governor General has issued a decree requesting the territory of cities, which recently revolted and imposing the extraordinary contribution of 250,000 francs upon them.

PARIS, July 27.—The Catholic Journals have published the letter of the Archbishop of Paris to the members of the League protesting in the name of liberty against the education bill.

Resignation and Appointments.

LONDON, July 27.—A dispatch from Constantinople to Reuters, dated today, says that the Sultan, having rejected that part of the programme of Kheiridin Pacha, Grand Vizier, relative to the establishment of a responsible Ministry, Kheiridin has definitely resigned.

ICE-CREAM FROM A BRASS KETTLE. PATRICKSBURG, Va., July 27.—Saturday evening Captain Daniel Dodson, Auditor of the Petersburg Railroad Company, with his wife, five daughters, two grand-children and a cook, were made seriously ill by eating ice cream custard, which had been boiled in a brass kettle.

The Fever at Memphis.

MEMPHIS, July 28.—Three new cases were reported to the Board of Health this morning. No deaths have occurred. A detail of 20 men from the colored military company has been ordered to do police duty during the day, as the entire strength of the regular police force has been assigned to night service. It has been raining steadily since day light. Dr. Samuel J. Ford, of Harris, Texas, arrived this morning. He will be sent out of the city today by order of John Johnson, Superintendent of Quarantine, as he has never had the fever and the inspectors at the Quarantine Station have been instructed not to permit unaccompanied people to enter the city.

Disasters at Sea.

LONDON, July 28.—The British ship River, Capt. Robinson, from San Francisco December 28, which arrived at Lorient, France, July 20, is ashore on one of the Sicily Islands. It is expected she will become a total wreck. The crew have been rescued. A dispatch dated Valparaiso, July 26, to the Lloyd's says: The Pacific Steam Navigation Company's steamer Titman, of 4,000 tons, has been wrecked. All hands were saved.

Washington, D. C., July 28.—Dr. Beavis telegraphed from Orleans to the National Board of Health to-day as follows: "One fatal case of yellow fever at the corner of Second and Constance streets. Italian girl. The premises are filthy and crowded. No other case here."

Saratoga Races.

SARATOGA, July 28.—The first race, three-fourths of a mile, was won by Bonnie Wood, Mark L. second, Baihawk third, time 1:33.

Midnight Report.

Fatal Afiray.

GALVESTON, July 28.—A special dispatch to the Times from San Antonio gives the following particulars of the killing of Thomas E. Deewe, by Charles Temple, Charles Temple and James Ord, son of General Ord, Department Commander, were riding from the town of Pleasanton when they were halted by Thomas F. Deewe, between whom and Temple a feud existed. Temple asked what was wanted, and the latter knocked him from his horse with his fist. Temple retreated, but was followed by Deewe, who continued striking him. Finally Temple drew his knife and plunged it into Deewe's heart, causing instant death. Temple and Ord were arrested, but the latter has since been released.

The Fever at New York.

NEW YORK, July 28.—Michael Fitzgibbon, one of the Memphis refugees, who came here, died to-day at the quarantine of yellow fever. John Hennessy, one of the refugees, who assisted in unloading the steamer City of Memphis and contracted the yellow fever, died at the quarantine last night. A. F. Reih, barber of the steamer Carriago, and E. D. East, steward of the schooner Freddie C. Ebbitt, from the Hyattsville port, were admitted to the hospital to-day, sick with the fever.

Theatre Burned.

LONDON, July 28.—The Times has a dispatch confirming the reported destruction of the theatre in the Kremlin, Moscow, by an incendiary fire. The staircase was saturated with petroleum, probably by nihilists, and the torch applied. The theatre building burned five hours.

South American Affairs.

New York, July 28.—The Peruvian Minister, now here, has just received the following telegram from Senor Irigoien, Foreign Minister at Lima, via Panama: "The Huscar entered the blockaded port of Iquique and fought the Chunan squadron for two hours, leaving hours of combat the Cousino and Abtao. The Huscar is unhurt."

A Defaulter Arrested.

DERBY LINE, Vt., July 28.—Thomas Reed, the defaulting cashier of the First National Bank of Galveston, Texas, was arrested Friday at Granby, Quebec, by a detective. Reed was forty thousand dollars short in his accounts and absconded in January last.

Aid to the Sick.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The Secretary of War has telegraphed to the President of the Board of Health at Memphis, in response to an application for tents and rations, that rations will only be furnished to persons sick with the fever or in quarantine camp, who can be subsisted in no other way.

Trains Collided.

PHILADELPHIA, July 28.—Saturday night during the storm which flooded the tracks of the North Pennsylvania Road the Doylestown accommodation train and the Bethlehem Express collided near Edge Hill. Both trains were badly wrecked. Some of the passengers had limbs fractured, but no lives were lost.

A Suspicious Case.

CHICKENNAT, July 28.—Chris Myers, who left Memphis ten days ago, called on the health officer this afternoon, and said he believed he had the yellow fever. After an examination the officer sent him to the hospital as a suspicious case.

Turkish Affairs.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 28.—An irredeemable has just been issued declaring the Grand Vizier's resignation a necessity, abolishing the Grand Vizirate, and appointing Arif Paşa Premier and Sarif Paşa Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Died.

SELMA, Ala., July 28.—Hon W. Y. Little, President of the Alabama Senate, is dead.
