A LEAF FROM HISTORY.

Reminiscences of Grant's Early Experience in the War. An exchange p blished the following Commission Merchants.

etter, dated Raieigh, N. C., April 24, Sitting around a blazing camp fire, a few evenings since, several Illinois officers re in civil life. Here is, as nearly as I can

recollect it, what General John E. Smith said on the subjet: I don't believe any man in Illinois knew Grant better than I did, and I think I had quite as much to do as any other man in rivging him into the war. I lived in Galena at the same time. Grant's place of business was near mine. He kept a bard ware and saddlery store. I used to drop in to see him very often when I was on my way home, and he and I would generally smoke our pipes together in his office,

adjoining bis store.

He was a very poor business man, and never liked to wait on customers. If a RALEIGH, N. C., customer called in the absence of the clerks he would tell him to wait a few minutes till one of the clerks returned, and f he couldn't wait the General would go behind the counter, very reluctantly, and to nine cases out of ten charged either too much or too little. He would rather talk about the Mexican war than wait on the best customer in the world. When the war broke out I told him one day that I was going d wn to Springfield to see Gov ernor Yates, who had sent for me. Grant nerely remarked, in a quiet way : You can say to the Governor that if I can be of these regiments, I will be glad to do what can. I went to Springfield and madtrrangements for Grant to be sent for ie came right down and went to work to rganize ten regimen's called out as a sort home guard, for thirty days at first, but terward enlisted for three years. When had done this and was ready to go me, Governor Yates off red him the don lcy of the Twenty first Regiment, one

He accepted it, and immediately went camp. I went with him and I never hall forget the scope that occurred when is men first saw him. It was veraughable Grant was dressed very clum ily, in a suit of citizen's clothes-an old wat, worn out at the elbows, and a badly linged plug hat. His men, though ragged and barefooted themselves, had formed a igh estimate of what a colonel ought to e, and when Grant walked in among hem they began making fun of him They cried out in derision: "Look at our colonel!" "What a colonel!" "D-n such a colonel !" and made all sorts of fun of him. A few of them, to 'show off' to the others, got behind his back and began sparring at nim, and while one was doing this another gave him such a push that made him hit Frant a terrible blow between his shoulders. The General soon showed them that they must not judge the officer by the uniform, and before he got through he upruly fellows felt very much mor i fied. One of them generously confessed hat it was all in fun, and hoped the new coionel wouldn't get mad about it. Grant went to work immediately, and in a very short time had his men clothed and fixed up in good style.

A Thoroughly Organized Militia Force of 200,000 Men Recommended.

The annual report of Gen. S. V. Benet, chief of ordinarce, U. S. A. shows that he expenditures for the year were \$1. 443 998. A large portion of the report is devoted to the subject of the militia, favoring its re-organization by act of Congress. be mobilization of a certain portion i ach state, and providing for the d stribu ion of arms equally throughout the coun gate strength of the militia of the United States is as follows: Organized, 113 878. unorganized, 3,822,114; and only \$200, 000 is annually appropriated for their arms and equipments Gen. Benet holds that by liberal appropriations from Congress and a militia law strictly enforced an acive militia of 200 000 men could be kept in hand as a reserve force ready for any emergency, domestic or foreign. He recommends an annual appropriation of \$4.000,000 for the expenses of an annual encampment, the payment of each militia man of a per diem for each day's service in camp, e'c. In this way the benefits of he appropriation would be strictly confined to those States and to those individ uals complying with the requirements of the general law. In further elaboration of hese views Gen. Benet urges the organ zation of a national reserve, "under the constitutional power to raise and support


