Filipino Lawyers Captured With Offers of Judgeships.

GEN. OTTS DECIDED AGAINST APPLICATION TO HAVE ENG-LISH LAWS ADOPTED.

HERE'S MORE SEDITION LAW FOR YOU

Two American Correspondents Have Been Debarred. The Court Composed of Men Who Have Deserted. Aguinaldo.

Manila, May 29.-7 p. m.-An order has been issued re-establishing the Philippine courts which have been closed since the American occupation. It revives all the Spanish system not conflicting with the sovereignty of the United States.

The chief justice is Cayetano Arrelano. The associates of the civil branch are Manuel Araulla, Colonel Crowder and Gregorio Aranita. The justices of the criminal branch are Raymundo Melliza, Ambrosio Rian-zares Julio Lorento, Major Young and Captain Birkhimer. 'Ine Attorney General is Florentio Torres. This corresponds with the American Supreme

The oath prescribed begins:
"I recognize and accept the supreme authority of the United States of America," etc.

The Filipino members are all prominent lawyers. Arrellano is the leader of his profession in the islands. In the early stages of the Filipino mvement he was Aguinaldo's principal adviser. Aranita was a member of Aguinaldo's first cabinet. Molliza was President of the insurgent govern-ment at noilo; Torres is the leader of the local committee working with the commission to conciliate the insurrectionists.

Spanish will be the official language

of the courts. There has been agitation among the local British and American business men and American lawyers who came to the Philippines to make fortunes, to have the English code and language adopted, but Major General Otis concluded that it would be unwise, even if practicable, to upset long usage. He thought it best to give the the language to native courts in which they have been accustomed. The Spanish salaries proved a stumbling block to obtaining good men, The highest is only \$2,500, the Spanish judges receiving fees, which are abolished. All the judges are representative men.

Two correspondents of a New York newspaper have been disbarred for fabricating an interview with Genera Lawton, dated May 23 at Manila, and for evading the censorship.

The steamer El Cano has arrived

But the Filipinos Fired Upon American Soldiers.

Manila, May 29 .- 11:25 a. m .- Cap tain Tilley of the Signal Corps, with a detachment made up of other menbers of the corps, landed at Escalanto on the Island of Negros, to pick up and repair the cable. The natives had a white flag flying over the cable house when the party landed.

CARGO ON FIRE.

Hamburg, May 29.-A fire occurred in the cargo of the British steamer Glencoe, Captain Elmes, which arrived here on Saturday from Norfolk. It was extinguished in about an hour after its discovery. Its origin is attributed to spontaneous combustion in the cotton seed in the cargo. The extent of the damage done has not yet been ascertained.

A HORRIBLE MURDER.

Mutilated Body of a Sailor From Kentucky.

San Francisco, Cal., May 26 .- The hama and Honolulu, brings news of a murder of a sailor named George Ryan near Malols. His frightfully mutilated body was found April 27th lashed to a raft floating in the river. The skull had been crushed and both arms had been cut off at the clows.

GOV. HOLLIDAY DEAD.

Though Not a Successful Administration, It Was Honest.

Richmond, Va., May 29.—Ex-Gover-nor Frederick William Mackay Helliday died at his home in Winchester this morning, aged 71 years. He was born in Winchester, graduated from the Academic Department of Yale and took the law course at the Universit, of Virginia. When the Civil War broke out he was practicing law, but immediately entered the service of his native State. He was soon tender ed, and accepted, the commission of an infantry company, later rose to the colonelcy of a regiment in the Stonewall Brigade and lost an arm at Slaughter's Mountain. Upon retirement from the service he was elected to the Confederate Congress, in which he served until the end of the war. He was a commissioner from WILL PLAY THE UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA Virginia to the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia n 1876, and was elected Governor of Virginia on the Democratic ticket in November, 1877, tak ing his seat January 1st, 1878. His term extended through one of the most exciting periods of the Virginia debt agitation, and though his administration is not ranked as a successful one, it was pure and honest Ex-Governor Holliday had been a close student and a great traveller, and was a fine speaker.

GROUNDING OF "RALEIGH"

CAPT. COGHLAN OUGHT. TO HAVE EM-PLOYED A PILOT.

In the Opin'on of the Court no Further Preceedings Should be Had Abou it.

Washington, May 29-Admiral Remey, composing a court of inquiry appointed to investigate the circumstances of the ent grounding of the cruiser Raleigh at the entrance of the harbor of Charleston, S. C., filed his report with the Navy Department.

The findings and opinion of the court of inquiry are as follows:

that the shoal upon which the U.S.S. Raleigh grounded on May 9th, 1899, has recently been growing to the southward and has encroached upon the bearing. and a safe guide for the entrance to Charleston harbor of vessels of the Raleigh's draught.

OPINION.

1. In the opinion of the court no further proceedings should be had against any officer or man attached to the U. S. S. Raleigh.

2. In the opinion of the court, Cap tain Jos. B. Coghlan, U. S. Navy, considering the Raleigh's draught, should have employed a licensed local pilot before entering the harbor of Charleston, S. C. because of the warning printed changes in the shoal at the entrance resulting from improvements in progress under the direction of the corps of engineers U. S. Army, and that strangers should not enter without a pilot. The court, however, is disinclined to discourage in any way a commanding officer from piloting his own vessel under ordinary circumstances.

THEY ARE ON TRIAL.

The Eleven Men Charged With Beating Negroes to be Tried.

Griffin, Ga., May 29.—The eleven men in jail charged with being members of the gang who have beating negroes had a hearing this afternoon. Justice Carr ruled that the grand jury was the proper tribunal to investigate the matter.
