Destroyed.

CAUGHT IN TRAP OF FLAME

Narrow Stairs.

SAW COMPANIONS IN BLINDING FLAMES

Those Who Escaped Lost Their Clothing and Had to Travel Almost Naked Through Eight Inches of Snow to At-

other Camp.

(By the Associated Press.)

Hambleton, W. Va., Jan. 21 .- About 4 o'clock this morning the camp of the Otter Creek Boom and Lumber Company, several miles from here, caught fire and was destroyed. An explosion is believed to have started the flames, which spread with feadful rapidity. There were forty men sleeping in the camp and of these seven perished. The surrounding forest caught fire from the conflagration. Following is the list of the dead:

BUD WELSH was so badly burned that he is in a critical condition.

It was not more than five minutes from the time when the alarm was given until there was no chance of escape. The camp was 22 by 50 feet and the upper part all in one room, and in this the forty men were sleeping.

Two very small windows and the narfew stairs afforded the only ways of escape, and of those who went to the windows, a dozen or more had to jump twelve or fifteen feet, the others rushing down the steps like sheep, pushing and tumbling and falling over each other. After they were out, some of the men inside could be seen in the flames, but not a cry came from the building. The dead were almost entirely cre-

mated. There were scarcely forty pounds of the flesh and bones of the seven brought here tonight in a little box. The men who escaped lost their cloth-

ing and were compelled to travel through eight inches of snow almost naked to another camp a mile away.
