(By the Associated Press.) Washington, D. C., May 15 .- The House today was plunged into an exciting debate on Philippine affairs. Thus far the subject of alleged atrocities in the islands has engaged the attention of the Senate alone and only occasional echoes have been heard in the House. But today the reports of cruelty and outrage were rehearsed in the House with the same vehemence and bitterness that has at times characterized the discussion in the Senate. The naval bill was the order of the day but it received only scant attention, after the allegations of Phil-

ippines outrages were presented. A speech by Mr. Vandiver (Mo.), reciting instances of alleged outrage brought on the discussion which at times developed into a wordy warfare across the aisle separating the two sides of the chamber.
