MR. O'DONNELL'S VIEWS.

Favors Prohibiting Stillies Outside of Incorporated Towns

A special to the Asheville Citizen says:

Ex-President O'Donnell, of the State Liquor Dealers Association, says he favors Senator Simmons' plan to prohibit the location of liquor distilleries outside of cities or incorporated towns.

"The scheme was originated by one of the leading editors in the State several weeks ago.

"O'Donnell favors a high license of the saloon in some counties where there is no county tax on saloons. He thinks it is even more necessary to have distillers under police regulations than saloons. The officer of the association favors the \$300 State license on saloons, in counties and cities which do not impose more tax than the State does. The present revenue to the State is \$7,000. His plan will yield \$10,000.

Miss Merritt Injured.

A special from New York gives the particulars of an injury sustained by Miss Annie Lee Merritt, daughter of Prof. A. H. Merritt, formerly of Chatham county, now of Mt. Airy. It says: "Annie Lee Merritt, 35 years old, whose residence is not known to the police, was the victim of a peculiar accident today. She was taken to the Presbyterian Hospital with severe contusions of the head and body. Near Lexington avenue, in East Fifty-ninth street, contractors are excavating for a new building, and have reached a depth of 25 feet. In place of the sidewalk along the excavation a temporary bridge has been constructed, on either side of which there are railings. The railings are about three feet high and midway between the top and walk there is lateral piece of wood. At the bottom of this excavation she was found. "Investigation shows that she was Anna Lee Merritt, of Mount Airy, N. C., and a Miss Chambers, of 230 West Twenty-third street, asked Police Captain Brown to notify the Post-Graduate Hospital, saying that Miss Merritt had many friends among the nurses there. The injured woman is still unconscious in the Presbyterian Hospital and is in a critical condition."
